United Nations

UNSC unanimously adopts additional sanctions against N. Korea

On 22 December 2017, he U.N. Security Council unanimously adopted Resolution 2397, imposing new sanctions on North Korea (DPRK) following its 28 November intercontinental ballistic missile test in "violation and flagrant disregard of the Security Council's resolutions." The Resolution adds individuals and the Armed Forces Ministry to the sanctions list established in UNSC Res. 1718.

The Resolution requires all Member States to prohibit the direct or indirect supply, sale or transfer to the DPRK, through their territories or by their nationals, or using their flag vessels, aircraft, pipelines, rail lines, or vehicles and whether or not originating in their territories, of all crude oil, unless the UN Committee approves in advance on a case-by-case basis a shipment of crude oil which is exclusively for livelihood purposes of DPRK nationals and unrelated to the DPRK's nuclear or ballistic missile programmes or other activities prohibited by UNSC resolutions. This prohibition shall not apply with respect to crude oil that, for a period of twelve months after the date of adoption of this resolution, and for twelve months periods thereafter, does not exceed 4 million barrels or 525,000 tons in the aggregate per twelve month period but countries providing crude must report every 90 days.

The Resolution further requires all Member States to prohibit the direct or indirect supply, sale or transfer to the DPRK, through their territories or by their nationals, or using their flag vessels, aircraft, pipelines, rail lines, or vehicles, and whether or not originating in their territories, of all refined petroleum products, *decides* that the DPRK shall not procure such products, *further decides* that this provision shall not apply with respect to procurement by the DPRK or the direct or indirect supply, sale, or transfer to the DPRK, through their territories or by their nationals, or using their flag vessels, aircraft, pipelines, rail lines, or vehicles, and

whether or not originating in their territories, of refined petroleum products, including diesel and kerosene, in the aggregate amount of up to 500,000 barrels during a period of twelve months beginning on January 1, 2018, and for twelve month periods thereafter, provided that (a) the Member State notifies the Committee every thirty days of the amount of such supply, sale, or transfer to the DPRK of refined petroleum products along with information about all the parties to the transaction, (b) the supply, sale, or transfer of refined petroleum products involve no individuals or entities that are associated with the DPRK's nuclear or ballistic missile programmes or other prohibited activities.

The Resolution also prohibits the DPRK from supplying, selling or transferring, directly or indirectly, from its territory or by its nationals or using its flag vessels or aircraft, food and agricultural products (HS codes 12, 08, 07), machinery (HS code 84), electrical equipment (HS code 85), earth and stone including magnesite and magnesia (HS code 25), wood (HS code 44), and vessels (HS code 89), and requires all States to prohibit the procurement of the above-mentioned commodities and products as well as of all industrial machinery (HS codes 84 and 85), transportation vehicles (HS codes 86 through 89), and iron, steel, and other metals (HS codes 72 through 83) from the DPRK by their nationals, or using their flag vessels or aircraft, whether or not originating in the territory of the DPRK. However, the latter does not apply with respect to the provision of spare parts needed to maintain the safe operation of DPRK commercial civilian passenger aircraft (currently consisting of the following aircraft models and types: An-24R/RV, An-148-100B, II-18D, II-62M, Tu-134B-3, Tu-154B, Tu-204-100B, and Tu-204-300).

With certain exceptions, the Resolution provides that Member States shall repatriate to the DPRK all DPRK nationals earning income in that Member State's jurisdiction and all DPRK government safety oversight attachés monitoring DPRK workers abroad immediately but no later than 24 months from the date of adoption of this resolution.

The Resolution also permits Member States to seize, inspect, and freeze (impound) any vessel in their ports, and may seize, inspect, and freeze (impound) any vessel subject to its jurisdiction in its territorial waters, if the Member State has reasonable grounds to believe that the vessel was involved in activities, or the transport of items, prohibited by UNSC resolutions.

World Trade Organization (WTO)

ITC, UNCTAD, WTO launch Global Trade Helpdesk

On 11 December 2017, the WTO <u>announced</u> that the International Trade Centre (ITC), the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) and the WTO unveiled an innovative tool to help businesses, in particular smaller firms, benefit from trade. Accessible through a new online hub – <u>Help-MeTrade.org</u> – the Global Trade Helpdesk will serve as a one-stop shop for businesses and policymakers to access trade data and practical information on target markets.

New proposals submitted for draft agreement on fisheries subsidies

On 3 November 2017, the WTO <u>announced</u> that at the 31 October-3 November meeting of the Negotiating Group on Rules (NGR), members discussed in detail a previously-circulated text compiling seven earlier proposals, with a number of

members suggesting insertions and other amendments to that text. Members also exchanged views on areas of the negotiations to intensify ahead of the 11th Ministerial Conference (MC11) in Buenos Aires in December. For details see the WTO news item here.

Pesticide residues top of agenda of WTO food safety body

On 3 November 2017, the WTO <u>announced</u> that WTO members raised a range of trade concerns on pesticides in food products at the Committee on Sanitary and Phytosanitary Measures (SPS) on 2-3 November. Meanwhile, they were unable to bridge gaps on a proposed decision on pesticide residues at the forthcoming 11th Ministerial Conference (MC11). For details see the WTO <u>news item</u> here.

Members enter into substantive discussions on implementation of Trade Facilitation Agreement

On 3 November, the WTO <u>announced</u> that at a meeting of the WTO's Committee on Trade Facilitation, members for the first time engaged in substantive discussions on ongoing efforts to implement the Trade Facilitation Agreement (TFA), which formally entered into force last February. The announcement said:

Since February, the committee has received 21 notifications from members regarding so-called Category A, B and C notifications. Category A covers TFA commitments developing members promised to implement upon entry into force of the TFA; Category B covers commitments that a developing or least-developed country (LDC) member will implement after a transitional period following the entry into force of the agreement; and Category C covers commitments that a developing or LDC member will implement after a transitional period following the entry into force of the Agreement and that require technical assistance and capacity-building support to implement.

Developed countries were required to implement all provisions of the TFA from the date of entry into force

In addition, the committee has now received 11 notifications from members which the chair described as having "transparency" objectives, either in a broader context or in relation to particular provisions of the TFA, such as single window operations, the use of customs brokers, and customs cooperation.

Finally, the committee has received seven notifications from donor members since February under Article 22 of the TFA which provide information on assistance and support for capacity building that will be made available to members requiring such assistance.

All the notifications are available in the WTO's <u>Trade Facilitation Agreement Database</u>.

Trade Policy Reviews: Bolivia and Cambodia

The fourth review of the trade policies and practices of the Plurinational State of Bolivia took place on 14 and 16 November 2017. The basis for the review is a report by the WTO Secretariat and a report by the Government of the Plurinational State of Bolivia.

The second review of the trade policies and practices of Cambodia took place on 21 and 23 November 2017. The basis for the review was a <u>report by the WTO Secretariat</u> and a <u>report by the Government of Cambodia</u>.

Trans-Pacific Partnership TPP Ministerial Statement

On 11 November 2017, in the margins of the APEC meetings in Da Nang, Vietnam, the TPP ministers of Australia, Brunei Darussalam, Canada, Chile, Japan, Malaysia, Mexico, New Zealand, Peru, Singapore and Vietnam, agreed to the following statement on the Trans-Pacific Partnership:

- 1. When we last met in Ha Noi, Viet Nam on 21 May 2017, the Ministers of Australia, Brunei Darussalam, Canada, Chile, Japan, Malaysia, Mexico, New Zealand, Peru, Singapore and Viet Nam, reaffirmed the balanced outcome and the strategic and economic significance of the TPP Agreement signed in Auckland on 4 February 2016 (hereinafter referred to as "the TPP") highlighting its principles and high standards as a way to promote regional economic integration and contribute to the economic growth prospects of its member countries, and create new opportunities for workers, families, farmers, businesses and consumers.
- In May, Ministers tasked officials to engage in a process of assessing options to bring the comprehensive, high quality Agreement into force expeditiously. Over the past several months, officials have worked to reach a balanced outcome that maintains the significant benefits of the TPP.
- 3. Ministers are pleased to announce that they have agreed on the core elements of the *Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement for Trans-Pacific Partnership* (CPTPP). Ministers agreed to Annex I and II (attached) which incorporates provisions of the TPP, with the exception of a limited set of provisions which will be suspended. This text also incorporates a list of four specific items for which substantial progress was made but consensus must be achieved prior to signing.
- 4. Ministers agree that the CPTPP maintains the high standards, overall balance, and integrity of the TPP while ensuring the commercial and other interests of all participants and preserving our inherent right to regulate, including the flexibility of the Parties to set legislative and regulatory priorities. Ministers also affirm the right of each Party to preserve, develop, and implement its cultural policies. Ministers consider that the CPTPP reflect the desire of the Parties to implement the TPP outcomes among themselves.
- Ministers confirm that the legal instrument proposed for the CPTPP allows the
 participants to act decisively in a timely manner to advance their shared objectives. Ministers reaffirm that the CPTPP demonstrates their firm commitment to
 open markets, to combat protectionism, and to advance regional economic integration.
- Noting Article 6 of the CPTPP, Ministers shared the view that the scope of a review may extend to proposals to amend the CPTPP, to reflect the circumstances concerning the status of the TPP.
- Furthermore, Ministers decided that all the TPP side letters signed among the 11 countries will be maintained in principle, unless the relevant Parties decide otherwise.
- Ministers tasked officials to continue their technical work, including continuing their efforts toward finalising those items for which consensus has not yet been achieved, and legal verification of the English text and translation, to prepare finalised text for signature.

- 9. Ministers recognize that each country will need to pursue its own domestic processes, including for public consultation, in advance of signature.

CPTPP: Making Trade Great Again but Concerns Linger

At the recent Asia Pacific Economic Cooperation ("APEC") Summit in Da Nang, Vietnam, the 11 remaining countries of the Trans-Pacific Partnership ("TPP11") took a significant step forward to finalize a new agreement now referred to as the *Comprehensive and Progressive Trans-Pacific Partnership* ("CPTPP"). Media reports were mixed as some outlets reported that there was an agreement in principle while others reported that Canada was not ready to sign on. However, the end result is an impressive draft agreement in principle on most of the existing terms with some key exceptions and a few remaining issues from Canada's perspective. To its credit, Japan has been leading the effort to move forward with the CPTPP in hopes of the United States rejoining the agreement at some point in the future.

Suspension of Certain Provisions

The CPTPP incorporates all of the Trans-Pacific Partnership ("TPP") agreement terms except for 20 provisions that will be put in "suspended" status. These suspended terms are mainly issues of interest to the United States including the operational provisions of the Investor State Dispute Settlement ("ISDS") chapter, commitments relating to labor rights, biologics, as well as intellectual property and copyright protection provisions.

The CPTPP still goes well beyond the simple duty reductions in a "normal" trade agreement to include principles on e-commerce, the environment, transparency and anti-corruption, regulatory coherence and cross border trade in services, among many other things. The CPTPP is a progressive agreement reflecting the "state of the art" in international trade and investment and an impressive achievement, if the 11 parties can see it through to execution and ratification.

Outstanding Issues

In addition to certain provisions being put in suspended status, the parties have yet to agree upon four parts of the agreement including state-owned enterprises related to Malaysia, commitments on coal relating to Brunei, dispute settlement involving trade sanctions for Vietnam and Canada's cultural exception. The parties will need to come to agreement on these four provisions prior to signing. Additionally, each party will need to have domestic political support for CPTPP as it will require ratification of each party and this may require further changes.

Perspective on Canada

At the conclusion of APEC, Canada Prime Minister Trudeau was reported as stating that he "wasn't going to be rushed into a deal that was not yet in the best interest of Canadians. That is what I've been saying at least for a week, and I've been saying it around TPP12 for years now and that position continues to hold." It was also reported the Prime Minister Trudeau said there is still "important work to be done," namely on the creation of a gender rights chapter, changes around

rules of origin — a part of the deal with particular salience to the auto parts sector — and issues surrounding Canada's protection and promotion of culture."

Canada's position on the CPTPP may be influenced by the current North America Free Trade Agreement ("NAFTA") negotiations where country of origin requirements for automobiles have been a point of contention. Additionally, Canada's attempt to incorporate the Investor State Court ("ISC") concept that was developed as part of the Canada-European United Comprehensive Economic Trade Agreement ("CETA") into CPTPP may be futile. This is because Japan categorically rejected the ISC concept in its free trade agreement negotiations with the EU for the Japan European Union Economic Partnership Agreement ("JEEPA"). Similarly, the EU dropped all reference to ISDS and the ISC when it initiated negotiations with New Zealand and Australia.

Canada's push for the ISC is interesting in light of the threat of the United States to withdraw from NAFTA. Not having a CPTPP in place if the United States were to withdraw from NAFTA, could weaken Canada's negotiating position with the remaining CPTPP members who could also ratify the deal without Canada's involvement.

Japan's Leadership

What motivated Japan's remarkable leadership in the APEC CPTPP negotiation was two fold. First, remains the hope of bringing the United States back to the multilateral global trading system at some point in the future. Second, there was also an opportunity to have the first high-level free trade multilateral agreement in Asia Pacific, which could boost Japan's economy and establish more sophisticated trade rules than the bilateral agreements Japan has entered into to date. The CPTPP also sets the minimum standard of the bilateral negotiation between Japan and the United States, even if such bilateral negotiations seem difficult to avoid.

CPTPP Impact

The impact of the CPTPP will not be as great as the TPP would have been, in terms of its quantitative contribution to growth, though it is hard to measure because the reforms in CPTPP go well beyond mere duty rate reduction. Moreover, as the agreement reflects the best practice standard in many areas such as ecommerce, regulatory coherence, transparency, environment and labor, these areas will gain stronger footholds as principles of international trade and investment law, which can be used as building blocks for the future. Businesses in the region that are not from the TPP11 countries also support it because "a rising tide lifts all boats", and the growth will create opportunities for other trading partners as the TPP11 economies grow.

The CPTPP will affect some businesses in the region directly and some indirectly. There will also inevitably be some trade diversion to the TPP11/ CPTPP countries away from non-parties. But the results are likely to be that the GDP growth impact is far larger than the trade diversion impact. To the extent that the CPTPP further opens markets to healthy competition, it will challenge some businesses that currently hide behind various forms of protectionism. Overall, the CPTPP looks like something that will be good for the TPP11 members, achieving much more quickly than a series of bilateral deals, and it may eventually attract the US back into a multilateralist global trading system.

Looking Forward

One of the main topics for discussion in this year's APEC meetings was how governments must play a role in retraining and "up-skilling" their citizens to compete, not only in a more open trade and investment environment, but also in light of the 4th Industrial Revolution.

The CPTPP is one among several regional agreements making progress in the Asia Pacific region without the United States. Others include JEEPA and the *Regional Cooperative Economic Partnership* ("RCEP"). Although the Trump Administration currently says that it prefers bilateral agreements, some of its leverage in negotiating bilateral deals may be diminished as the multilateral agreements progress forward.

Further negotiations will be necessary to finalize the agreement however, the APEC was a pivotal moment for moving the CPTPP forward and the parties hope to have a signed agreement by the first part of 2018.

Preclearance Bill receives Royal Assent

On December 13, 2017, the Hon. Ralph Goodale, Minister of Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness, highlighted the importance of Bill C-23: An Act respecting the preclearance of persons and goods in Canada and the United States receiving Royal Assent. Royal Assent brings Canada and the United States closer to implementing the Agreement on Land, Rail, Marine and Air Transport Preclearance between the Government of Canada and the Government of the United States of America (the Agreement), done at Washington on March 16, 2015, to provide for the preclearance in each country of travellers and goods bound for the other country.

Once enabling regulations are in place, Canada and the United States can ratify the Agreement and start expanding preclearance operations to other modes of transportation – land, rail and marine – in addition to new locations in the air mode. The Agreement also opens the door to explore possibilities for cargo preclearance. The regulations for the air mode are expected to be in place by the end of 2018.

Canada extends steel import monitoring program to Nov. 2020

On November 2, 2017, Global Affairs Canada posted Notice to Importers <u>Serial No. 907</u>, which informs importers that the steel import monitoring program, covering items 80 (Carbon Steel) and 81 (Specialty Steel) of the *Import Control List* (ICL), has been extended to November 1, 2020.

Carbon steel products (ICL item 80) include semi-finished products (ingots, blooms, billets, slabs and sheet bars), plate, sheets and strip, wire rods, wire and wire products, railway-type products, bars, structural shapes and units, pipes and tubes made of carbon steel. These items are covered by Harmonized System (HS) headings 7206-7229.

Specialty steel products (ICL item 81) include stainless flat-rolled products (sheet, strip and plate), stainless steel bar, stainless steel pipe and tube, stainless steel wire and wire products, alloy tool steel, mold steel and high-speed steel. These items are covered by HS headings 7301-7302, 7304-7306, 7308, 7312-7313 and 7317.

The steel import monitoring program does not limit the quantity of carbon and specialty steel products that may be imported into Canada.

The Notice extends previous notices to importers concerning the steel import monitoring program and should be read in conjunction with the *Export and Import Permits Act* (EIPA) and the EIPA Regulations.

Pursuant to the provisions of section 8 of the EIPA, a general import permit has been established for each of these items, General Import Permit 80 (Carbon Steel) and General Import Permit 81 (Specialty Steel). The import documentation for each shipment of carbon and specialty steel products must state that it is being imported under the authority of General Import Permit No. 80 or 81. This requirement applies to all steel products with Harmonized System headings: 7206-7302, 7304-7306, 7308, 7312-13 and 7317.

Customs brokers and importers are urged to cooperate fully with the Trade and Export Controls Bureau of Global Affairs Canada, as administrators of the monitoring program. In particular, they are requested to ensure that quantity (in kilograms), value (in Canadian dollars), product classification, country of origin, supplier name and ad-

dress and importer name are given correctly, if necessary by amending the import documentation. Such cooperation will enhance the reliability of the data and reduce the burden of post-clearance auditing.

In the past, individual import permits (for which there were fees) were required for each shipment, except for certain lower value shipments and certain classes of importers. These provisions are no longer in effect.

Canada moves quickly on corruption and human rights sanctions

On October 18, 2017, the <u>Justice for Victims of Corrupt Foreign Officials Act</u> (<u>Sergei Magnitsky Law</u>) (the "Act") entered into force. The Act gives Canada the ability to impose unilateral sanctions against "foreign nationals" who are involved in corruption or gross violations of human rights.

For years, the *Special Economic Measures Act* ("SEMA") has been the primary mechanism by which the Government of Canada (the "Government") could impose unilateral sanctions against certain individuals and entities. Under SEMA, unilateral sanctions could only be imposed where the Government was of the opinion that a grave breach of international peace and security had occurred that had resulted or was likely to result in a serious international crisis.

The Act broadens the ability of the Government to impose sanctions by specifically identifying the following circumstances:

- (a) a foreign national is responsible for, or complicit in, extrajudicial killings, torture or other gross violations of internationally recognized human rights committed against individuals in any foreign state who seek
- (i) to expose illegal activity carried out by foreign public officials, or
- (ii) to obtain, exercise, defend or promote internationally recognized human rights and freedoms, such as freedom of conscience, religion, thought, belief, opinion, expression, peaceful assembly and association, and the right to a fair trial and democratic elections:
- **(b)** a foreign national acts as an agent of or on behalf of a foreign state in a matter relating to an activity described in paragraph (a);
- (c) a foreign national, who is a foreign public official or an associate of such an official, is responsible for or complicit in ordering, controlling or otherwise directing acts of corruption including bribery, the misappropriation of private or public assets for personal gain, the transfer of the proceeds of corruption to foreign states or any act of corruption related to expropriation, government contracts or the extraction of natural resources which amount to acts of significant corruption when taking into consideration, among other things, their impact, the amounts involved, the foreign national's influence or position of authority or the complicity of the government of the foreign state in question in the acts; or
- (d) a foreign national has materially assisted, sponsored, or provided financial, material or technological support for, or goods or services in support of, an activity described in paragraph (c).

"Foreign national" is defined broadly to mean an individual who is not (a) a Canadian citizen; or (b) a permanent resident under the *Immigration and Refugee Protection Act*

Just over two weeks after the Act came into force, on November 3, 2017, the Government issued the first set of sanctions under the Act through the *Justice for Victims of Corrupt Foreign Officials Regulations* (the "Regulations"). The Schedule to the Regulations lists 52 foreign nationals from Russia, Venezuela and

South Sudan that the Government has identified as being "responsible for, or complicit in, gross violations of internationally recognized human rights or acts of significant corruption." Listed foreign nationals can be found here.

The Act prohibits the following:

- (a) the dealing, directly or indirectly, by any person in Canada or Canadian outside Canada in any property, wherever situated, of the foreign national;
- **(b)** the entering into or facilitating, directly or indirectly, by any person in Canada or Canadian outside Canada, of any financial transaction related to a dealing referred to in paragraph (a); and
- **(c)** the provision by any person in Canada or Canadian outside Canada of financial services or any other services to, for the benefit of or on the direction or order of the foreign national;
- (d) the acquisition by any person in Canada or Canadian outside Canada of financial services or any other services for the benefit of or on the direction or order of the foreign national; and
- **(e)** the making available by any person in Canada or Canadian outside Canada of any property, wherever situated, to the foreign national or to a person acting on behalf of the foreign national.

All of the prohibitions above apply to any "person in Canada or Canadian outside Canada". The Act defines "person" to mean "an individual or an entity". "Canadian" is defined to mean "a person who is a citizen within the meaning of the *Citizenship Act* or a corporation incorporated or continued by or under the laws of Canada or of a province."

Global Affairs Canada, the federal agency tasked with administering Canada's sanctions regime, has published Backgrounders on its website for each of Russia, Venezuela and South Sudan, identifying the listed foreign nationals that are associated with each country, and the reasons for imposing the sanctions.

Mexico publishes government procurement thresholds for FTAs

On December 27, 2017, the *Diario Oficial* (Official Gazette) published the US Dollar and national money (Peso) thresholds for government procurements subject to free trade agreements. The Secretary of Public Functions notified the amounts in Office No. UNCP/309/TU/786/2017. The amounts are in effect from January 1, 2018 through June 30, 2018.

President Proclaims HTS modifications for AGOA, IFTA, CAFTA-DR

On December 27, 2017, the *Federal Register* published <u>Proclamation 9687 of December 22, 2017 - To Take Certain Actions Under the African Growth and Opportunity Act and for Other Purposes. The Proclamation:</u>

- restores eligibility for The Gambia and Swaziland as beneficiary sub-Saharan African countries under the African Growth and Opportunity Act (AGOA) by modifying the Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States (HTS);
- modifies the HTS to provide, through December 31, 2018, duty-free access into the United States under the US-Israel Free Trade Agreement through December 31, 2008, for specified quantities of certain agricultural products of Israel;
- modifies the HTS to conform to Harmonized System modifications recommended by the US International Trade Commission pursuant to section 1205 of the Omnibus Trade and Competitiveness Act of 1988;
- modifies the HTS to implement staged reductions under the Dominican Republic-Central America-United States Free Trade Agreement (CAFTA-DR);
- revises Annexes 4.1, 3.25, and 3.29 of the CAFTA-DR to ensure that the tariff and certain other treatment accorded under the CAFTA-DR to originating goods will continue to be provided under the tariff categories that were proclaimed in Proclamation 7987;
- modifies Annex I of Proclamation 9466 (Pharmaceutical and Chemical Appendix), as provided in Annex II of Proclamation 9687 to correct one inadvertent omission and to make certain additional conforming changes; and
- suspends Ukraine and restores Argentina's eligibility under the *Generalized System of Preferences* (GSP), which had been suspended in 2012.

The suspension of certain Ukrainian GSP benefits will take effect 120 days after the proclamation's publication in the *Federal Register*. According to USTR, Ukraine can remedy the suspension by "improving the current legal regime governing royalty reimbursement to right holders' organizations." Argentina's addition to GSP eligibility will take effect Jan. 1.

US Government implements the Global Magnitsky Act and publishes Magnitsky Act Sanctions Regulations and related designations

On December 20, 2017, President Trump signed <u>Executive Order ("Order")</u> 13818 titled "Blocking the Property of Persons Involved in Serious Human Rights

Abuses or Corruption". The Order implements the *Global Magnitsky Human Rights Accountability Act* ("Global Magnitsky Act"), which was signed into law on December 23, 2016 and which targets human rights abusers and corrupt actors globally. This is to be contrasted with the *Sergei Magnitsky Rule of Law Accountability Act of 2012* ("Magnitsky Act") targeting human rights abusers in Russia, with respect to which the US Treasury Department's Office of Foreign Assets Control ("OFAC") published regulations on December 21, 2017. In addition, OFAC designated a number of individuals and entities as Specially Designated Nationals ("SDNs") under the Magnitsky Act on December 20, 2017 and under the Global Magnitsky Act on December 21, 2017.

The Global Magnitsky Act authorizes the President to impose sanctions on any party (individual or entity) who:

- is responsible for extrajudicial killings, torture, or other gross violations of internationally recognized human rights committed against individuals in any non-US country seeking to expose illegal activity carried out by government officials, or to obtain, exercise, or promote human rights and freedoms;
- acted as an agent of or on behalf of a non-US person in such activities;
- is a government official, or a senior associate of such an official, that is responsible for, or complicit in, ordering, controlling, or otherwise directing, acts of significant corruption, including the expropriation of private or public assets for personal gain, corruption related to government contracts or the extraction of natural resources, bribery, or the facilitation or transfer of the proceeds of corruption to non-US jurisdictions; or
- has materially assisted, sponsored, or provided financial, material, or technological support for, or goods or services in support of, such activities.

OFAC <u>designated</u> 52 parties (15 individuals and 37 entities) as SDNs pursuant to the Global Magnitsky Act and the Order. This includes parties in a number of countries, including, among others, The Gambia, South Sudan, Russia, Nicaragua, China, Pakistan, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Dominican Republic, Uzbekistan, and Ukraine. These are the first designations under the Global Magnitsky Act. OFAC has issued <u>new FAQs</u> regarding the Order and these designations.

Though both the Global Magnitsky Act and the Magnitsky Act provide OFAC with the authority to designate SDNs, they are different statutes. The Magnitsky Act targets parties for certain actions related to the death of Russian lawyer Sergei Magnitsky, who died in 2009 after being arrested and tortured in custody by officers of the Russian government, or for involvement in human rights violations in Russia more generally. By contrast, the Global Magnitsky Act targets parties involved not only in human rights violations but also corruption and applies globally, not only to activities related to Russia. Our previous blog post about the Magnitsky Act-related sanctions can be found here. On December 20, 2017, OFAC designated five individuals in Russia under the Magnitsky Act and announced the issuance of the Magnitsky Act Sanctions Regulations, which were published on December 21, 2017.

As a result of the OFAC designations, all of the property and interests in property within US jurisdiction of the designated individuals and entities are blocked, and "US Persons" are generally prohibited from engaging in transactions with these SDNs and any entities 50% or more owned by these SDNs. "US Persons" include (i) entities organized under US laws and their non-US branches, (ii) individuals or entities in the United States, or (iii) US citizens or permanent resident

aliens ("Green Card" holders) wherever located or employed. Non-US Persons, including separately incorporated non-US subsidiaries of US companies, may be subject to US jurisdiction if they cause any SDN-related transactions to occur in whole or in part in the United States.

Trump Administration re-designates North Korea as a State Sponsor of Terrorism and designates additional parties

On November 27, 2017, the US State Department published a <u>notice</u> in the *Federal Register* that the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK; North Korea) was designated as a State Sponsor of Terrorism ("SST") on November 17, 2017. North Korea was originally designated as an SST in 1988 in connection with the bombing of a Korean Air flight but was delisted in 2008 by President George W. Bush as part of negotiations over its nuclear program.

In conjunction with North Korea's SST designation, the US Treasury Department's Office of Foreign Assets Control designated <u>one individual</u>, <u>13 entities</u>, <u>and 20 vessels</u> from North Korea and China as Specially Designated Nationals ("SDNs") on November 21, 2017, pursuant to <u>Executive Order 13810 of September 20, 2017</u>. In a <u>press release</u>, the US Treasury Department explained that it designated these parties and vessels because they have "long-standing commercial ties to North Korea [and are part of] the transportation networks that facilitate North Korea's revenue generation and operations."

North Korea's SST designation and the SDN designations build upon increasingly stringent sanctions targeting North Korea that have been imposed by the <u>United States</u>, <u>European Union</u>, and <u>Switzerland</u>, among others, in conjunction with increasing sanctions imposed by the United Nations. The other SST countries are <u>Iran, Syria, and Sudan</u>.

Legal Implications of the SST Designation

North Korea's SST designation triggers the following sanctions and restrictions:

- A licensing requirement for exports or reexports of goods or technology that could significantly enhance North Korea's military capability or ability to support terrorism;
- A prohibition on exports and reexports to North Korea of defense articles and defense services and related technology under the <u>International Traffic in Arms</u> Regulations ("ITAR");
- 3. A requirement for the United States to oppose loans to North Korea by the World Bank and other international financial institutions;
- 4. A prohibition on any assistance to North Korea under the Food for Peace, Peace Corps, and Export-Import Bank programs;
- 5. A prohibition on US Persons (i.e., entities organized under US laws and their non-US branches; individuals and entities physically located in the United States; and US citizens and permanent resident aliens, wherever located or employed) from engaging in financial transactions with the North Korean government without a license from the Treasury Department, under the Terrorism List Governments Sanctions Regulations; and

 An exception to sovereign immunity that would allow individual US Persons to bring claims against the North Korean government in US courts for personal injury and death resulting from terrorism or material support for terrorism.

The legal implications of North Korea's SST designation are likely to be limited. Many of the above activities remained prohibited by US sanctions or export controls during the period between 2008 and 2017 when North Korea was not an SST. During this period, North Korea has remained subject to the same antiterrorism controls as other SST countries under the *Export Administration Regulations* ("EAR") (as well as a comprehensive EAR export/reexport ban) (covering item #1 above), and North Korea has remained subject to a US arms embargo under the ITAR and EAR (covering item #2 above). In addition, since March 2016, North Korea has been subject to US comprehensive sanctions pursuant to Executive Order 13722 of March 15, 2016 (covering item #5 above).

Increased scrutiny for US-listed companies from the US Securities and Exchange Commission

In addition, the SST designation for North Korea may lead to increased scrutiny for US-listed companies if they engage in any dealings with North Korea. Specifically, the Office of Global Security Risk ("OGSR") within the US Securities and Exchange Commission periodically requests information from US-listed companies regarding any material dealings with SST countries if such dealings have not been previously disclosed in a company's regular annual and quarterly filings. Accordingly, US-listed companies can expect that OGSR inquiries may now ask about North Korea along with Iran, Sudan, and Syria.

President extends national emergency with respect to proliferation of WMDs

On November 8, 2017, the *Federal Register* published Presidential <u>Notice of November 6, 2017 - Continuation of the National Emergency With Respect to the Proliferation of Weapons of Mass Destruction</u>, which extends for an additional year the national emergency first declared by Executive Order (E.O.) 12938 (November 14, 1994) with respect to the unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security, foreign policy, and economy of the United States posed by the proliferation of nuclear, biological, and chemical weapons (weapons of mass destruction) and the means of delivering such weapons. E.O. 12938 was further amended by E.O. 13094 (July 28, 1998) and E.O. 13382 (June 28, 2005). The national emergency is being extended because the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction and the means of delivering them continues to pose an unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security, foreign policy, and economy of the United States.

President extends national emergency with respect to Iran

On November 8, 2017, the *Federal Register* published Presidential <u>Notice of November 6, 2017 - Continuation of the National Emergency With Respect to Iran</u>, which continues for an additional year the national emergency first declared in Executive Order (E.O.) 12170 (November 14, 1979) to deal with the unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security, foreign policy, and economy of the United States. The national emergency is being extended because United States

relations with Iran have not yet normalized, and the process of implementing the agreements with Iran, dated January 19, 1981, is ongoing. The emergency declared in E.O. 12170 is distinct from the emergency declared in E.O. 12957 on March 15, 1995. This renewal, therefore, is distinct from the emergency renewal of January 13, 2017.

President extends the national emergency with respect to Burundi

On November 8, 2017, the *Federal Register* published Presidential <u>Notice of November 6, 2017 - Continuation of the National Emergency With Respect to Burundi</u>, which continues for an additional year the national emergency first declared in Executive Order (E.O.) 13712 (November 22, 2015) to deal with the unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security and foreign policy of the United States constituted by the situation in Burundi, which has been marked by the killing of and violence against civilians, unrest, the incitement of imminent violence, and significant political repression, and which threatens the peace, security, and stability of Burundi and the region. The national emergency is being extended because The situation in Burundi continues to pose an unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security and foreign policy of the United States.

House and Senate MTBs introduced

On November 9, 2017, the Chairman and Ranking member of the House Ways and Means Committee introduced H.R. 4318, the bipartisan *Miscellaneous Tariff Bill Act of 2017* (MTB), based on the August 2017 US International Trade Commission report, as required by *American Manufacturing Competitiveness Act of 2016*, bipartisan legislation that revised the MTB process. It is understood that a companion bill was introduced by the Chairman and ranking member of the Senate Finance Committee. The MTB will temporarily suspend or reduce tariffs on raw materials needed for U.S. production or manufacturing and on goods that are not available in the US. If a domestic producer objects to a article being covered, it is usually dropped from consideration. The proposed bills affect about 1,675 tariff subheadings. In the past the MTB has often been joined with provisions to extend or renew certain tariff preference programs, such as AGOA and GSP.

USTR determines trade surplus of sugar goods

On December 28, 2017, the Office of the United States Trade Representative (USTR) published in the *Federal Register* a notice of its determination of the trade surplus in certain sugar and syrup goods and sugar containing products of Chile, Morocco, Costa Rica, the Dominican Republic, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Peru, Colombia and Panama. The level of a country's trade surplus in these goods relates to the quantity of sugar and syrup goods and sugar-containing products for which the United States grants preferential tariff treatment under the applicable free trade agreements and trade promotion agreements. The notice is applicable on January 1, 2018. USTR determined that for Panama, the Dominican Republic, Chile, Morocco and Peru imports of sugar and syrup goods and sugar-containing products had exceeded its exports of those goods resulting in a negative amount (a trade deficit) and therefore the countries were not eligible for duty-free or preferential rates.

USTR determined that Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua and Colombia had trade surpluses in sugar and syrup goods and sugar-containing products and thus such goods from those countries were eligible in

USTR requests comments for 2018 Special 301 review

On December 27, 2017, the Office of the United States Trade Representative (USTR) published in the *Federal Register* a <u>request for comments and notice of public hearing</u> [Docket No. USTR–2017–0024] for the Special 301 review to identify countries that deny adequate and effective protection of intellectual property rights (IPR) or deny fair and equitable market access to U.S. persons who rely on intellectual property protection. Based on this review, the USTR determines which, if any, of these countries to identify as Priority Foreign Countries. USTR requests written comments that identify acts, policies, or practices that may form the basis of a country's identification as a Priority Foreign Country or placement on the Priority Watch List or Watch List. USTR also requests notices of intent to appear at the public hearing. For schedule, see *Federal Register* notice

USTR publishes TAA Procurement Thresholds

On December 11, 2017, the Office of the United States Trade Representative (USTR) published in the *Federal Register* a notice setting the dollar procurement thresholds to implement certain U.S. trade agreement obligations, as of January 1, 2018, for calendar years 2018 and 2019. Executive Order 12260 requires the USTR to set the U.S. dollar procurement thresholds for application of Title III of the *Trade Agreements Act of 1979*, as amended (TAA; 19 U.S.C. 2511 *et seq.*). These obligations apply to covered procurements valued at or above specified U.S. dollar thresholds.

USTR requests comments regarding Administration's action following a import injury determination with regard to large residential washers

On Nov. 30, 2017, the Office of the US Trade Representative (USTR) published in the *Federal Register* a <u>request for comments and notice of public hearing</u> [Docket No. USTR–2017–0023] following a import injury determination with regard to large residential washers.

The US International Trade Commission (ITC) has determined that large residential washers are being imported into the United States in such increased quantities as to be a substantial cause of serious injury to the domestic industry producing an article that is like or directly competitive with the imported articles. The Commissioners who voted in the affirmative are now conducting a process to recommend a remedy (or safeguard measure) for the President to apply. USTR, on behalf of the Trade Policy Staff Committee (TPSC), is announcing a process so that, once the ITC makes its recommendation, domestic producers, importers, exporters, and other interested parties may submit their views and evidence on the appropriateness of the recommended safeguard measure and whether it would be in the public interest. USTR also invites interested parties to participate in a public hearing regarding this matter.

USTR publishes additional information about participating in the process following a determination of import injury with regard to certain crystalline silicon photovoltaic cells

On Nov. 14, 2017, the USTR published in the *Federal Register* a <u>notice</u> [Docket No. USTR–2017–0020] that provides additional information on the Trade Policy Staff Committee (TPSC) process to allow interested parties to submit views and

evidence on the appropriateness of safeguard measures recommended by the United States International Trade Commission concerning certain the import of crystalline silicon photovoltaic (CSPV) cells. The notice provides deadlines for the submission of written comments and requests to testify at a public hearing scheduled for Dec. 6. 2017.

USTR publishes GSP CNL statistics and petition deadlines

On Nov. 14, 2017, USTR published in the *Federal Register* a <u>notice</u> [Docket No. USTR–2017–0014] of statistics availability relating to competitive need limitations (CNLs) under the *Generalized System of Preferences* (GSP) program and deadline for submission of petitions to waive the CNLs for individual beneficiary developing countries (BDCs) with respect to specific GSP-eligible articles. The GSP Subcommittee of the Trade Policy Staff Committee (TPSC) had to receive CNL waiver petitions by midnight, December 5, 2017.

ITC revises Rules of General Application

On December 26, 2017, the International Trade Commission (ITC) published in the *Federal Register* a <u>final rule</u> that amends provisions of its Rules of Practice and Procedure concerning the Privacy Act (19 C.F.R. part 201). The amendment is designed to delete certain exemptions that pertain only to systems of records that the ITC has removed and to add exemptions that pertain to a new system of records. The final rule is effective January 25, 2017.

Update on CBP forced labor activities

This is an update on the developments with regard to U.S. Customs and Border Protection's (CBP) enforcement of the U.S. import ban on goods made with forced labor (19 U.S.C. § 1307). The last few months have seen both <u>significant changes in the law and in CBP's enforcement activity</u>. While the reputational risks of a forced labor entanglement remain as high as ever, these changes mean that (1) the likelihood of encountering enforcement activity has increased, and (2) the elements of a "compliant" forced labor program are evolving. We have summarized the background, recent developments and our recommendations below.

Background - Import Ban & Loophole

As you may recall, in early 2016, Congress removed a loophole in the near-80 year old statute banning the importation of goods made with forced labor. The effort to remove this loophole was led for many years by Senator Bernie Sanders, and was later championed by Senator Sherrod Brown. The loophole had permitted goods made with forced labor to be imported whenever U.S. demand outstripped domestic supply (the "consumptive demand exception"). The consumptive demand exception resulted in there being little application/enforcement of the import ban for most of its history.

CBP's Old Enforcement Mechanism

Within weeks of the consumptive demand exception being removed, CBP initiated four new enforcement actions under a mechanism the agency adopted in the 1960's. This older enforcement mechanism allows CBP to issue "withhold release orders" (or WROs) for shipments of articles manufactured by a specific named foreign entity, which CBP has reason to believe may have been produced with forced labor. An importer may challenge the imposition of a WRO, but only on a shipment-by-shipment basis.

The WRO mechanism has shown itself to be a blunt instrument. Companies named in a WRO are likely to suffer significant economic harm, with little-to-no opportunity to review or respond to the allegations before the WRO is put in place. The relative ease with which CBP can impose a WRO (upon information which "reasonably, but not conclusively" indicates the presence of forced labor) corresponds directly with the profound difficulty in having a WRO removed. As we have explained previously, once a WRO is in place, it is difficult to have it removed (the standard for imposing a WRO is relatively low, but for removal is quite high).

CBP's Emerging Approach to Enforcement

While the WRO mechanism remains a viable tool for CBP's enforcement of the forced labor ban, CBP has also begun taking steps to hold U.S. importers more directly accountable for forced labor compliance. Most notably, CBP recently updated its informed compliance publication governing "reasonable care" to specify that importers are expected to have documented controls in place to mitigate the risk of importing goods made with forced labor. Specifically, CBP expects importers to be able to answer questions such as (but not limited to):

Have you taken reliable measures to ensure imported goods are not produced wholly or in part with convict labor, forced labor, and/or indentured labor (including forced or indentured child labor)?

Have you established reliable procedures to ensure you are not importing goods in violation of 19 U.S.C. § 1307 and 19 C.F.R. §§ 12.42-12.44?

Have you obtained a "ruling" from CBP regarding the admissibility of your goods under 19 U.S.C. § 1307 (see 19 C.F.R. Part 177), and if so, have you established reliable procedures to ensure that you followed the ruling and brought it to CBP's attention?

CBP has broad authority to determine "admissibility" (whether an article presented for importation complies with "the requirements of the laws of the United

States") and to detain articles until compliance is confirmed. As a result, importers who cannot answer these questions run the risk of having their goods detained or seized. CBP is laying the groundwork for it to be able to (1) deny entry of merchandise that an importer cannot prove was <u>not</u> made with forced labor, and (2) assess penalties for forced labor violations against companies without adequate controls.

CBP has recently begun issuing requests for information (via CBP Form-28s, or informal requests from ISA account managers) asking importers to produce documentation regarding their forced labor policies and controls.

North Korea Forced Labor Presumption

In August 2017, as part of an wide-ranging sanctions bill, the forced labor ban was again modified. The statute now specifies that merchandise made by North Korean laborers, regardless of location, is presumed to be made with forced labor, and, therefore, subject to the import ban. No official guidance has been provided to use in determining whether North Korean laborers may be present in a given supply chain. The risk of North Korean labor appears to be especially high in northeastern China, but North Korean laborers are known to be working in more than a dozen industries across more than 40 countries, according to the U.S. government. Recent statements by U.S. government officials have made it clear that importers are expected to have updated their forced labor (and/or CSR) policies to take this change in the law into account.

Recommendations

In view of these developments, we have the following recommendations.

- Update your CSR/forced labor compliance program to reflect the recent changes in the law, including the presumption with respect to North Korean labor. An effective forced labor compliance program will be tailored to a company's forced labor risk profile (e.g., industry, area of the world, type of production, direct/indirect sourcing, etc.). It will include updated policies around vendor/factory set-up and audit, and may include revisions to master sourcing agreements, POs and/or vendor contracts. Depending on the risk profile, it may also include changes to sourcing activity.
- 2. Prepare a memorandum explaining your forced labor compliance program to CBP. All importers (and those in certain higher risk industries, such as apparel and footwear, in particular) should anticipate getting a question about their forced labor compliance program and prepare accordingly. While many companies have robust CSR programs (that are hopefully now updated to account for the recent changes in the law – see #1 above), we believe it will be important to "translate" that program into "Customs speak". Stated differently, if CBP is going to ask about your forced labor controls (an area in which it has little expertise), it is in your interest to have an answer that addresses its concerns, in a language it understands. Just like one should not provide CBP solely with transfer pricing documentation in response to an inquiry about the acceptability of intercompany customs values, one should not provide CBP solely with CSR documentation in response to an inquiry about the admissibility of goods due to forced labor concerns. Producing documentation that recognizes CBP's concern and summarizes your program from a customs perspective will go a long way to minimizing the interaction; whereas providing just the underlying CSR documentation and hoping CBP finds what it needs will likely prolong it.
- 3. Ensure that any query you receive from CBP relating to forced labor (whether by CBP Form-28 or other means) is reviewed by counsel before it is responded to. In our experience, companies can sometimes be eager to provide information to CBP which they believe it will cast them in a favorable light. There will likely

come a time and place for sharing such information with CBP, but doing so comes with risks, particularly if your forced labor/ CSR program has not yet been updated to reflect all relevant recent changes in the law. If you receive any specific queries, please let us know. We are advising several clients on these and related matters, and would be glad to assist.

We are working with several clients to implement these recommendations. We have developed questionnaires to pull together the relevant aspects of a company's existing CSR program, are updating those programs to account for the change in the law and are preparing reports summarizing the programs from a customs perspective (so the client's have a response ready to provide CBP when needed). We are also assisting several clients respond to general, as well as specific, inquiries from CBP in this area.

CBP delays ACS to ACE transition of monthly statement processing

On December 8, 2017, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) published in the *Federal Register* a <u>notice</u> announcing a delay of transition of statement processing. On November 8, 2017, CBP published a notice in the *Federal Register* announcing plans to make the Automated Commercial Environment (ACE) the sole electronic data interchange (EDI) system authorized by CBP for generating, transmitting, and updating daily and monthly statements for all entries except reconciliation (type 09) entries. The changes announced in that notice were to become operational on December 9, 2017. This notice announces that the date for the transition to ACE as the sole CBP authorized EDI system for statement processing is delayed until January 6, 2018. ACE will not be the official system of records for statements until that time.

As of January 6, 2018, ACE will be the sole CBP-authorized EDI system for generating, transmitting, and updating daily and monthly statements, and the Automated Commercial System (ACS) will no longer be a CBP authorized EDI system for such purpose.

CBP to conduct pilot test program for electronic collections

On December 8, 2017, CBP published in the *Federal Register* a general notice that announces that CBP will be conducting a pilot test program to allow for the electronic payment of certain taxes and fees imposed on commercial vessels prior to or upon a vessel's arrival at four designated ports of entry. The pilot also introduces portable, electronic devices that authorized CBP employees will use to electronically process payments of certain taxes and fees and to send electronic receipts via email. The pilot will not affect the amount of taxes and fees due, the clearance process, or the proof of documentation required to be presented to CBP. The notice describes the pilot, including its purpose, procedures, locations, and how to participate, and invites public comment on any aspect of the pilot. The pilot will begin no earlier than January 8, 2018 and will continue for 18 months at the designated ports of entry. Comments concerning this notice and all aspects of the pilot may be submitted at any time during the pilot.

CBP adjusts certain penalties for inflation

On December 8, 2017, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) published in the Federal Register a final rule [CBP Dec. 17-20] that amends CBP regulations to adjust for inflation the amounts that CBP can assess as civil monetary penalties for the following three violations—transporting passengers between coastwise points in the United States by a non-coastwise qualified vessel; towing a vessel between coastwise points in the United States by a non-coastwise qualified vessel; and dealing in or using an empty stamped imported liquor container after it has already been used once. These adjustments are being made in in accordance with the Federal Civil Penalties Inflation Adjustment Act Improvements Act of 2015 (2015 Act) which was enacted on November 2, 2015. Other CBP civil penalty amounts were adjusted pursuant to this 2015 Act in previously published rule documents published in the Federal Register on July 1, 2016, and January 27, 2017, but the adjustments for these three civil penalties were inadvertently left out of those documents. This rule is effective on December 8, 2017. The adjusted penalty amounts will be applicable for penalties assessed after December 8, 2017 if the associated violations occurred after November 2, 2015.

Emergency import restrictions imposed on archaeological and ethnological materials from Libya

On December 5, 2017, CBP published in the Federal Register a final rule [CBP Dec. 17-19] that amends the CBP regulations to reflect the imposition of emergency import restrictions on certain archaeological and ethnological materials from Libya. The Acting Under Secretary for Public Diplomacy and Public Affairs, United States Department of State, has determined that conditions warrant the imposition of emergency import restrictions on categories of archaeological and ethnological materials from Libya, which represent the cultural heritage of Libya. The Federal Register document contains the Designated List of Archaeological and Ethnological Material of Libya that describes the types of objects or categories of archaeological or ethnological material to which the import restrictions apply. The emergency import restrictions imposed on certain archaeological and ethnological materials from Libya will be in effect for a five-year period. These restrictions are being imposed pursuant to determinations of the United States Department of State made under the terms of the Convention on Cultural Property Implementation Act, which implements the 1970 United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) Convention on the Means of

Prohibiting and Preventing the Illicit Import, Export and Transfer of Ownership of Cultural Property.

CBP amends list of user fee airports

On November 24, 2017, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) published in the *Federal Register* a <u>final rule; technical amendment</u> [CBP Dec. 17-18] that amends the CBP regulations by revising the list of user fee airports to reflect the removal of user fee status for Meadows Field Airport in Bakersfield, California and the designation of user fee status for four additional airports: Griffiss International Airport in Rome, New York; Van Nuys Airport in Van Nuys, California; Cobb County Airport-McCollum Field in Kennesaw, Georgia; and Charlotte-Monroe Executive Airport in Monroe, North Carolina. User fee airports are those airports which, while not qualifying for designation as international or landing rights airports, have been approved by the Commissioner of CBP to receive, for a fee, the services of CBP officers for the processing of aircraft entering the United States, and the passengers and cargo of those aircraft.

Customs brokers user fee payment for 2018

On November 24, 2017, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) published in the *Federal Register* a <u>general notice</u> to customs brokers that the annual user fee that is assessed for each permit held by a broker, whether it may be an individual, partnership, association, or corporation, is due by January 26, 2018. Pursuant to fee adjustments required by the *Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act* (FAST Act) and CBP regulations, the annual user fee for calendar year 2018 will be \$141.70.

CBP issues regulations on donations of technology and related support services to enforce intellectual property rights

On November 15, 2017, CBP published in the *Federal Register* a final rule [USCBP-2016-0076; CBP Dec. 17- 21] that amends the CBP regulations relating to the enforcement of intellectual property rights. This final rule implements section 308(d) of the *Trade Facilitation and Trade Enforcement Act of 2015* (TFTEA), which requires CBP to prescribe regulatory procedures for the donation of technologies, training, or other related services for the purpose of assisting CBP in intellectual property enforcement.

This document implements section 308(d) of the TFTEA by promulgating a new subpart H to part 133 of title 19 of the Code of Federal Regulations (C.F.R.) which provides for the receipt and acceptance by CBP of donations of hardware, software, equipment, and similar technologies, as well as training and related support services, for the purpose of assisting CBP in enforcing IPR. New subpart H, as set forth in § 133.61, prescribes the methods by which donations of IPR technology and related support services may be made. Specifically, 19 C.F.R. 133.61(a) sets forth the scope of this section and identifies the authority to accept donations, § 133.61(b) describes the donation process, and § 133.61(c) lays out the elements of the written donation agreement.

The rule is effective January 16, 2018.

ACE to be sole EDI system for generating and updating statements

On November 8, 2017, CBP published in the *Federal Register* a general notice announcing that as of December 9, 2017, the Automated Commercial Environment (ACE) will be the sole electronic data interchange (EDI) system authorized

by CBP for generating, transmitting, and updating daily and monthly statements for all entries except reconciliation (type 09) entries. The document also announces that the Automated Commercial System (ACS) will no longer be a CBP-authorized EDI system for processing such statements.

Section 505 of the *Tariff Act of 1930*, as amended (19 U.S.C. 1505), establishes the requirement for importers of record to deposit with CBP the amount of duties and fees estimated to be payable on merchandise unless that merchandise is entered for warehouse or transportation, or under bond. According to 19 C.F.R. 141.101, estimated duties shall either be deposited with a CBP officer at the time of filing of entry or entry summary documentation, or be transmitted to CBP pursuant to the statement processing method. Statement processing is a voluntary automated program for participants in the Automated Broker Interface (ABI) which allows entries to be grouped on a daily basis by importer or filer, and allows payment of related duties, fees and taxes by a single payment. The preferred method of payment for users of statement processing is by Automated Clearinghouse (ACH). A CBP-authorized EDI system, generates the statement, which is transmitted electronically to the filer, consisting of a list of entry summaries and the amount of duties, fees and taxes due for payment.

As an alternative to paying ACH statements on a daily basis, participants in the periodic monthly statements (PMS) test may pay ACH statements on a monthly basis. A PMS summarizes daily statements into a consolidated statement each month for a single monthly payment by the 15th working day of the month following the month of entry or release.

Both types of statements have been generated, transmitted and updated using the Automated Commercial System (ACS). Beginning December 9, 2017, they will use ACE instead, except for type 09 (reconciliation) entries. Until reconciliation entries are filed in ACE, statements for reconciliation entries will continue to be generated, transmitted and updated in ACS. Once reconciliation entries are filed in ACE, ACE will be the sole CBP-authorized EDI system for generating, transmitting and updating all statements, and ACS will no longer be a CBP authorized EDI system for such purpose.

CBP issues GSP instructions

On December 19, 2017, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) issued <u>CSMS# 17-000789</u>, Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) Due to Expire on December 31, 2017 which sets forth procedures for the GSP program. It is set forth below:

Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) Due to Expire on December 31, 2017:

Barring Congressional action, the Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) special program indicator (SPI) "A," "A+," and "A*" will expire for goods entered or withdrawn from warehouses after midnight, December 31, 2017.

Special Procedures for GSP-Eligible Goods:

In the event of a lapse and until further notice, importers are strongly encouraged to continue to flag otherwise GSP-eligible importations with the SPI "A" pay Normal Trade Relations (column 1) duty rates. Importers may not file SPI "A" without duties.

Programming:

In the event that GSP is renewed with retroactivity, CBP is developing programing to provide for the batch processing of refunds on all importations made with SPI "A" and duties paid.

Up-to-Date Importer of Record (IOR) Information:

Ensure all importer of record information in ACE is up-to-date and valid, including the importer's mailing address and banking information, if importer is a member of CBP's ACH refund program. Accurate records will ensure any potential refunds may be processed expeditiously.

Post-Importation GSP Claims Made via PSC and Protest

Subsequent to the expiration of GSP, CBP will continue to allow post-importation GSP claims made via post summary correction (PSC) and protest (19 U.S.C. 1514, 19 C.F.R. 174) on importations made while GSP was still in effect. Until further notice, CBP will not allow post-importation GSP claims on importations made subsequent to the expiration of GSP.

African Growth and Opportunity Act (AGOA):

The expiration of GSP has no effect on goods entered under the African Growth and Opportunity Act (AGOA). Effective January 1, 2017, the Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States (HTSUS) was modified with the addition of the SPI "D" in the "Special" column of all non-textile, AGOA-eligible tariff items. AGOA preference remains in effect through September 30, 2025, irrespective of any lapse in GSP.

Merchandise Processing Fee (MPF):

The expiration of GSP has no effect on either the collection or waiver of the Merchandise Processing Fee (MPF). Goods of least-developed beneficiary developing countries (LDBDCs) listed in HTSUS General Note 4(b)(i) maintain their MPF exemption per 19 C.F.R. 24.23(c)(1)(iv).

Time of Entry:

CBP will be monitoring time of entry. Per 19 C.F.R. 141.68(a)(2) & (3), time of entry can be as early as the time that the entry documents are filed, provided the merchandise is within the port limits and the entry documents have been requested. For additional information on the significance of time of entry and how to calculate it, please see page 11 of the Informed Compliance Publication, "What Every Member of the Trade Community Should Know About: Entry," available at www.cbp.gov/sites/default/files/documents/icp073 3.pdf.

Extension of Liquidation:

Requests for the suspension of liquidation under 19 CFR 159.12 will be denied on importations of otherwise GSP-eligible goods imported during the lapse period.

CBP issues year-end immediate delivery procedures

On December 18, 2017, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) issued CSMS# 17-000786 setting forth year-end immediate delivery procedures. The text is set forth below:

The Office of Trade is issuing a blanket authorization for Immediate Delivery (ID) procedures for merchandise to be released on or after December 18, 2017 through December 31, 2017, in accordance with 19 C.F.R. § 142.21(i). The authorization is of-

fered to filers who may elect to take advantage of the interim *Harmonized Tariff Schedule* changes, which take effect on or after January 1, 2018.

This blanket authorization does not apply to absolute quota merchandise and merchandise moved under an immediate transportation entry (type 61). Tariff rate quota merchandise previously authorized for ID release under 19 C.F.R. § 142.21 (e) may still be released; however, the entry summary shall be presented within the time specified in 19 C.F.R. § 142.23 or within the quota period, whichever expires first.

ABI entry transmissions, including the "paperless" provisional messages, will establish the desired entry date by using the estimated entry date in the summary transmission ("AE" transmissions). This will identify the change from "Entry" to "Immediate Delivery" and will allow filers to elect a date of entry in order to take advantage of tariff changes or special programs. Under ID procedures, the entry/entry summary must be filed within 10 working days after release. This blanket authority only extends to shipments released December 18, 2017 through December 31, 2017. No grace period will be granted for the purpose of timely filing ID entry summaries under this one-time allowance.

CBP sets requirements for imports of Mexican sugar per amended AD/CVD agreements.

On November 27, 2017, CBP issued <u>CSMS# 17-000739</u> setting forth requirements for the importation of other sugar from Mexico into the Customs Territory of the United States in accordance with amendments to the agreements suspending the AD/CVD investigations on sugar from Mexico. The pertinent parts of the CSMS are set forth below:

The Department of Commerce (Commerce) published in the *Federal Register* on 12/29/2014 (79 FR 78039) the notice of "Sugar From Mexico: Suspension of Antidumping Investigation", effective 12/19/2014. Imports of sugar from Mexico are subject to the terms and conditions of the Agreement Suspending the Antidumping Duty Investigation on Sugar from Mexico (the AD Agreement) between Commerce and signatory producers or exporters of sugar from Mexico. See Commerce AD/CVD instructions to U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) in message numbers 4365304 dated 12/31/2014 and 5086304 dated 03/27/2015.

In addition, Commerce published in the *Federal Register* on 12/29/2014 (79 FR 78044) the notice of "Sugar From Mexico: Suspension of Countervailing Investigation", effective 12/19/2014. Imports of sugar from Mexico are subject to the terms and conditions of the Agreement Suspending the Countervailing Duty Investigation on Sugar from Mexico (the CVD Agreement) between Commerce and the Government of Mexico. See Commerce AD/CVD message numbers 4364303 dated 12/30/2014, 5086305 dated 03/27/2015, and 5338301 dated 12/04/2015.

On July 11, 2017, Commerce published in the *Federal Register*, an amendment to the AD agreement (collectively, the amended AD Agreement, 82 FR 31945) signed by Commerce and the signatory producers and exporters of sugar from Mexico and an amendment to the CVD agreement (collectively, the amended CVD Agreement, 82 FR 31942) signed by Commerce and the Government of Mexico. The amended AD and CVD agreements apply to all contracts for Sugar from Mexico for the October 1, 2017 through September 30, 2018 Export Limit Period (as defined in the amended CVD Agreement), and to all contracts for Sugar from Mexico (regardless of Export Limit Period) exported from Mexico on or after October 1, 2017.

In accordance with the amended CVD Agreement, presentation to CBP of a valid export license issued by the Government of Mexico continues to be a condition of entry for shipments of sugar from Mexico covered by the amended agreement and entered, or withdrawn from warehouse, for consumption on or after 02/17/2015. See Message 7219308, dated 08/07/2017. In addition, importers must report the Mexican sugar export license with the Entry Summary data.

In accordance with newly-added Section VII.C.6 of the amended AD Agreement, Commerce, in message number 7216303 dated 08/04/2017, requested that CBP inform the importing public of the following requirements for the importation of Other Sugar from Mexico (as defined in the amended AD Agreement and the amended CVD Agreement), as follows:

Other Sugar may enter the Customs territory of the United States if the following conditions are met:

- 1. Exporters of Other Sugar are required to ensure, through inclusion of obligations in their sales contracts or otherwise, that:
 - a. importers of record of such Other Sugar agree to ensure that Other Sugar is tested for polarity by a laboratory approved by CBP upon entry into the United States, with samples drawn in accordance with CBP standards, and;
 - b. the importers of record agree to report the polarity test results for each entry to the Department of Commerce within 30 days of entry.
- 2. Such polarity test reports must be filed on the official Commerce records for both the AD Agreement and the CVD Agreement.
- 3. For clarity, sampling will be done in accordance with CBP standards (e.g., CBP Directive No. 3820-001B), or its successor directive as agreed by Commerce and the signatory producers and exporters of sugar from Mexico, including the CBP requirement that the polarity level of an entry will be the average of the samples from that entry.

Testing may be completed by CBP Laboratories & Scientific Services (CBP Labs), a federal government laboratory system, which supports the enforcement of U.S. trade laws. The CBP Labs can accept raw sugar samples from importations if sampled and submitted in accordance with CBP Directive 3820-001B, however the CBP Labs cannot issue reports directly to importers of record. The CBP Lab reports can only be issued to the port of entry or the CBP Import Specialist assigned to the entry. If an importer wishes to receive a copy of a CBP Lab report regarding their entry, the importer must request the report from the port of entry or the Import Specialist assigned to the entry.

In the interest of satisfying the Department of Commerce requirements and timelines for importations of other sugars from Mexico, it is recommended that samples be sent to the lone CBP Accredited Laboratory for the analysis of sugar, R. Markey & Sons, Inc. in New York, which will be able to issue their laboratory reports directly to the importer who submits the sugar sample. Their accreditation status allows their reports to be used for customs purposes and are sufficient for meeting the Commerce requirement "that importers of record of such Other Sugar agree to ensure that Other Sugar is tested for polarity by a laboratory approved by U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP)."

EEI requirements for EPA effective December 31, 2017

US Customs and Border Protection <u>CSMS# 17-000796</u> dated December 21, 2017 reminds the public of Environmental Protection Agency export reporting requirements that are effective December 31, 2017. The CSMS states:

Starting December 31, 2017, exporters of RCRA (*Resource Conservation and Recovery Act*) manifested hazardous waste for recycling or disposal, spent lead-acid batteries (SLABs) being shipped for recovery of lead, and universal waste (UW) being shipped for recycling or disposal must comply with filing EPA-specific information as part of their Electronic Export Information (EEI) filing in the Automated Export System (AES) per EPA regulations in 40 CFR 263.83(a)(6)(ii). Exporters of whole or broken cathode ray tubes (CRTs) being shipped for recycling must similarly comply with filing EPA-specific information in AES per 40 CFR 261.39(a)(5)(v)(B) starting on that date. Both EPA regulations require filing the EPA-specific items in the EEI, along with the other information required under 15 CFR 30.6.

EPA's Acknowledgement of Consent (AOC) meets the definition of an export license under U.S. Census Bureau regulations at 15 CFR 30.1. As such, RCRA exporters are already required to file the EEI in AES regardless of shipment value or destination country under 15 CFR 30.2(a)(iv)(F). RCRA exporters are also required to file in AES predeparture in accordance with 15 CFR 30.4(b).

Census posts guide for routed export transactions

On November 8, 2017, the U.S. Census Bureau posted "<u>Combating the Fear of Routed Export Transactions - A Guide for the U.S. Authorized Agent and U.S. Principal Party in Interest</u>" on its Global Reach blog. The guide provides general advice for all the parties in a routed export transaction

FinCEN imposes special measure against Bank of Dandong

On November 8, 2017, the Financial Crimes Enforcement Network (FinCEN), Treasury published in the *Federal Register* a final rule to prohibit covered U.S. financial institutions from opening or maintaining a correspondent account for, or on behalf of, Bank of Dandong Co., Ltd. (Bank of Dandong) as a financial institution of primary money laundering concern pursuant to Section 311 of the *USA PATRIOT Act*. The rule further requires covered U.S. financial institutions to take reasonable steps not to process transactions for the correspondent account of a foreign banking institution in the United States if such a transaction involves Bank of Dandong. It also requires covered institutions to apply special due diligence to their foreign correspondent accounts that is reasonably designed to guard against their use to process transactions involving Bank of Dandong.

The final rule is effective December 8, 2017.

OFAC amends Iraq Stabilization and Insurgency Sanctions Regulations

On December 28, 2017, the Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) published in the *Federal Register* a final rule amending the *Iraq Stabilization and Insurgency Sanctions Regulations* (31 C.F.R. part 576) to implement Executive Order (E.O.) 13668 of May 27, 2014 ("Ending Immunities Granted to the Development Fund for Iraq and Certain Other Iraqi Property and Interests in Property Pursuant to Executive Order 13303, as Amended"). The amendments also implement certain technical and conforming changes.

OFAC issues Magnitsky Act Sanctions Regulations

On December 21, 2017, OFAC published in the *Federal Register* a <u>final rule</u> adding regulations (31 C.F.R. part 584) to implement certain provisions of the *Sergei Magnitsky Rule of Law Accountability Act of 2012* (the Act). The Act provides authority for the identification of and imposition of sanctions on certain persons related to the detention, abuse, and death of Sergei Magnitsky or responsible for certain gross violations of human rights in the Russian Federation.

OFAC removes Côte d'Ivoire Sanctions Regulations

On November 13, 2017, OFAC published in the *Federal Register* a <u>final rule</u> removing from the Code of Federal Regulations the *Côte d'Ivoire Sanctions Regulations* as a result of Executive Order 13739, terminating the national emergency, on which the regulations were based.

OFAC and BIS issue final rules implementing Trump's Cuba policy

The US Department of the Treasury's Office of Foreign Assets Control ("OFAC") and the US Commerce Department's Bureau of Industry and Security ("BIS") announced final rules effective November 9, 2017, implementing the National Security Presidential Memorandum ("NSPM") "Strengthening the Policy of the United States Toward Cuba," signed by President Trump on June 16, 2017. These final rules are available here and h

In addition to the OFAC and BIS changes, the US Department of State published the List of Restricted Entities and Subentities Associated with Cuba ("Cuba Restricted List"), which provides a list of entities with which direct financial transactions are now generally prohibited under the Cuban Assets Control Regulations ("CACR").

We have summarized the key changes made by OFAC, BIS, and the State Department below.

US State Department Cuba Restricted List

The US State Department published and will maintain the Cuba Restricted List (available here), which includes a list of entities and subentities that are under the control of, act for or on behalf of, the Cuban military, intelligence, or security service or personnel, and with which direct financial transactions would disproportionality benefit the Cuban military, intelligence, or security services or personnel at the expense of the Cuban people or private enterprise in Cuba. The Cuba Restricted List includes a wide variety of entities in Cuba including certain Cuban ministries, holding companies, tourist agencies, retail and other stores, entities directly serving the Cuban defense and security sectors, and more than 80 hotels. Importantly, entities or subentities owned or controlled by another entity or subentity on the Cuba Restricted List will not be treated as restricted unless specified by name on the Cuba Restricted List.

OFAC Final Rule

As required by the NSPM, OFAC issued a Final Rule (the "OFAC Final Rule") effective November 9, 2017, which amends the CACR as follows:

Financial Transactions: Pursuant to section 3(a)(ii) of the NSPM, OFAC amended the CACR to add a new § 515.209 to restrict direct financial transactions with entities and subentities listed on the Cuba Restricted List. Subject to certain exemptions, a person engages in a direct financial transaction, "by acting as the originator on a transfer of funds whose ultimate beneficiary is an entity or subentity on the Cuba Restricted List or as the ultimate beneficiary on a transfer of funds whose originator is an entity or subentity on the Cuba Restricted List." Such transactions include transactions by wire transfer, credit card, check, or payment of cash. The OFAC Final Rule further revised § 515.421 of the CACR to

clarify that transactions ordinarily incident to licensed transactions do not include direct financial transactions with entities identified on the Cuba Restricted List if the terms of the applicable general or specific license exclude such direct financial transactions. OFAC added corresponding language to implement this prohibition in the following general licenses: §§ 515.530, 515.534, 515.545, 515.560, 515.561, 515.564, 515.565, 515.566, 515.567, 515.572, 515.573, 515.574, 515.576, 515.577, 515.578, 515.581, 515.584, and 515.590.

- Educational Travel: The OFAC Final Rule revised the categories of educational travel set forth in § 515.565(a)(1)-(6) of the CACR to authorize educational travel only under the auspices of an organization that is a person subject to US jurisdiction. Authorized educational travelers must be accompanied by a person subject to US jurisdiction who is an employee, paid consultant, agent or other representative of the sponsoring organization, unless the traveler is the representative and obtains a certification letter from the sponsoring organization. OFAC added a "grandfathering" provision in § 515.565(d) of the CACR to authorize certain travel that was previously authorized where the traveler has already completed at least one travel-related transaction (e.g., purchasing a flight or reserving accommodation) prior to the publication of the OFAC Final Rule on November 9, 2017.
- People-to-People Educational Travel: Individual people-to-people nonacademic educational travel is no longer authorized under the CACR. Section 515.565(b) of the CACR was revised to require that people-to-people education travel be conducted under the auspices of an organization subject to US jurisdiction which sponsors such exchange. Travelers must be accompanied at all times by a person subject to US jurisdiction who is an employee, paid consultant, agent or other representative of the sponsoring organization. Travel-related transactions authorized under this section must be for the purposes of engaging, while in Cuba, in a full-time schedule of activities that enhance contact with the Cuban people, support civil society in Cuba, or promote the Cuban people's independence from Cuban authorities. OFAC also added a "grandfathering" provision into § 515.565(e) of the CACR to authorize certain people-to-people travel that was previously authorized where the traveler has already completed at least one travel-related transaction (e.g., purchasing a flight or reserving accommodation) prior to the June 16, 2017 NSPM.
- Support for the Cuban People: The Final Rule amended § 515.574 of the CACR to require that each traveler engage in a full-time schedule of activities that result in meaningful interaction with individuals in Cuba and that enhance contact with the Cuban people, support civil society in Cuba, or promote the Cuban people's independence from Cuban authorities.
- Definition of Prohibited Officials of the Government of Cuba: The definition of the term "prohibited officials in the Government of Cuba" in CACR § 515.337 was amended to include certain additional individuals to correspond with the definition which was in place prior to the October 17, 2016 rule.

In addition to the changes described above, OFAC issued new and updated <u>Cuba FAQs</u> to reflect the changes from the OFAC Final Rule implementing the NSPM. The following FAQs are of particular note (though this is not a comprehensive list):

- FAQ 17: OFAC clarified in new FAQ 17 that individual people-to-people travel is
 education exchange travel that (i) does not involve academic study; and (ii) does
 not take place under the auspices of an organization subject to US jurisdiction
 that sponsors such exchanges. Such individual people-to-people travel is no
 longer authorized under the CACR; however, travelers who have already completed at least one travel-related transaction prior to the NSPM may engage in
 related individual people-to-people travel.
- FAQs 47-48: These new FAQs explain the Cuba Restricted List (further detailed above) and provide examples of direct financial transactions with entities on the Cuba Restricted List which would be prohibited. For example, a person subject to US jurisdiction traveling to engage in an authorized family visit under CACR §

515.561 would not be authorized to book a hotel room directly with a hotel included on the Cuba Restricted List. An individual working for a church subject to US jurisdiction interested in establishing a presence in Cuba pursuant to CACR § 515.573(d)(3) would be prohibited from signing a new contract directly with a real estate company on the Cuba Restricted List to rent a location for the church's physical presence.

- FAQ 67: OFAC noted that US originating banks and US beneficiary banks are
 generally not required to independently verify whether a person subject to US jurisdiction is engaging in direct financial transactions as defined in CACR §
 515.209 when processing Cuba-related transactions. Such financial institutions
 are expected to conduct normal due diligence with respect to Cuba-related
 transactions but may rely on customer statements as to whether the transaction
 is authorized unless the financial institution has reason to know the transaction is
 not authorized.
- FAQ 74: OFAC clarified that most Cuba-related commercial engagements that
 include direct financial transactions with entities and subentities identified on the
 Cuba Restricted List continue to be permitted, provided that those commercial
 engagements were in place prior to November 9, 2017 (or the date the entity or
 subentity is otherwise added to the Cuba Restricted List). By way of example,
 businesses will be permitted to continue with authorized transactions outlined in
 contingent or other types of contractual arrangements agreed to prior to the issuance of the new regulations, consistent with other OFAC authorizations.

BIS Final Rule

BIS also issued a final rule (the "BIS Final Rule") amending the licensing policy for Cuba and portions of three license exceptions available for re/exports to Cuba under the Export Administration Regulations ("EAR") as follows:

Cuba Licensing Policy: Pursuant to section 3(a) of the NSPM, BIS amended note 2 to § 746.2(b)(3)(i) to clarify that BIS has a policy of denial for applications for the re/export of items for use by entities or subentities listed on the Cuba Restricted List unless such transactions are determined to be consistent with the NSPM.

Prohibited Cuban Government Officials: License Exceptions Gift Parcels and Humanitarian Donations ("GFT"), Consumer Communications Devices ("CCD"), and Support for the Cuban People ("SCP") specify certain eligible and ineligible parties to which re/exports may be authorized. Pursuant to section 3(d) of the NSPM and conjunction with OFAC's amended definition of prohibited officials of the Government of Cuba, BIS amended the list of ineligible Cuban government officials for transactions invoking License Exception GFT, CCD, or SCP.

Cuban Private Sector: Pursuant to section 2(d) of the NSPM, the BIS Final Rule revised § 740.12(b) to create a single, consolidated provision authorizing the re/export to Cuba of items for use by the Cuban private sector for private sector economic activities. The items must be designated as "EAR99" or controlled only for Anti-Terrorism reasons on the EAR's Commerce Control List. In addition, the items may not be used to primarily generate revenue for the Cuban state or to contribute to the operation of the state, including through the construction of state-owned buildings. Though the revised § 740.12(b) does not specify the specific types of items which may be re/exported under SCP, medicines, medical devices, and agricultural commodities are not eligible for this license exception.

BIS also issued new and revised Cuba FAQs in connection with the EAR amendments. Of particular note, BIS clarified that the change in licensing policy will not affect licenses issued by BIS prior to the publication of the BIS Final Rule and added in new FAQ 67, which confirms that the re/export of agricultural commodities, medicines, or medical devices using License Exception SCP is not permitted.

BIS amends EAR

On December 27, 2017, the Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS) published in the *Federal Register* a <u>final rule</u> [170207157-7157-01] that corrects certain provisions in the *Export Administration Regulations* (EAR) to provide accurate references and fix typographical errors, and amend several Export Control Classification Numbers (ECCNs) to enhance consistency with the other ECCNs on the Commerce Control List (CCL). The corrections are editorial in nature and do not affect license requirements.

BIS seeks comments on the impact of the CWC on commercial activities

On November 29, 2017, BIS published in the *Federal Register* a <u>notice of inquiry</u> [Docket No. 171025999–7999–01] seeking public comments on the impact that implementation of the *Chemical Weapons Convention* (CWC), through the *Chemical Weapons Convention Implementation Act* (CWCIA) and the *Chemical Weapons Convention Regulations* (CWCR), has had on commercial activities involving "Schedule 1" chemicals during calendar year 2017. The purpose of this notice of inquiry is to collect information to assist BIS in its preparation of the annual certification to Congress on whether the legitimate commercial activities and interests of chemical, biotechnology, and pharmaceutical firms are being harmed by such implementation. This certification is required under Condition 9 of Senate Resolution 75, April 24, 1997, in which the Senate gave its advice and consent to the ratification of the CWC. Comments must be received by December 29, 2017

APHIS provides guidance for soybean exports to China

In late December 2017, the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) advised U.S. soybean farmers and exporters of a new procedure to comply with China's phytosanitary import requirements. The new procedure, which applies to both bulk and container shipments of raw, unprocessed soybeans to China, goes into effect January 1, 2018, and is necessary to maintain the uninterrupted flow of U.S. soybeans to the United States' largest export market.

In September, Chinese officials notified APHIS of foreign material exceeding Chinese standards as well as weed seeds of quarantine concern in U.S. soybean shipments to that country. The new procedure involves APHIS notifying China when a soybean shipment exceeds 1 percent foreign material by placing an additional declaration on the phytosanitary certificate that says, "This consignment exceeds 1 percent foreign material." APHIS said that Chinese officials have assured the United States that this notification will allow all U.S. soybean exports to

China, including those with more than 1 percent foreign material, to continue without interruption until the United States is able to fully implement a series of science-based measures from farm to export terminal, called a systems approach, during the 2018 crop year and reduce the volume of foreign material and weed seeds in soybean shipments to China.

APHIS makes import guidance for wood and wood products easier to find and understand

On December 14, 2017, the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) announced publication of the revised Wood and Wood Products section of the <u>Miscellaneous and Processed Product Manual</u> (MPPM). This major update does not change APHIS' import requirements for wood and wood products; it simply makes them easier to find and understand, according to APHIS. Specific changes include:

- Reorganizing requirements into subsections, such as wood products from Canada or wood packaging material
- Placing information in shorter tables, making it easier for the user to follow a decision pathway
- Removing redundant language that is provided directly to importers on their permits, helping to reduce the wood and wood product section's overall length by 50%
- Identifying and eliminating decision "dead ends" which left users without final, clear direction
- Creating a new section in the manual that provides clear guidance for importing handicrafts, including wooden handicrafts

APHIS indicates that these improvements will make it easier for importers to navigate the guidance and comply with APHIS requirements, which, in turn, will facilitate movement of wood and wood products through ports of entry.

This revision is part of a larger 18-month effort to clarify agency guidance and improve communication with both APHIS stakeholders and U.S. Customs and Border Protection inspectors on wood and wood product requirements. Through this effort, APHIS also produced the <u>Wooden Handicraft Website</u>, which provides detailed, easy-to-understand guidance for importing wooden handicrafts into the United States.

Government Procurement: DoD adds Latvia as qualifying country

On December 28, 2017, the Defense Acquisition Regulations System, Department of Defense (DoD) published in the *Federal Register* a final rule [Docket DARS-2017-0020] amending the *Defense Federal Acquisition Regulation Supplement* (DFARS) to add Latvia as a qualifying country. On April 10, 2017 the US Secretary of Defense and the Latvian Minister of Defense signed a Reciprocal Defense Procurement Agreement. On the same day, the US Secretary of Defense made a determination and findings that it is inconsistent with the public interest to apply the restrictions of the *Buy American Act* to the acquisition of articles, materials, and supplies, produced or manufactured in the Republic of Latvia. The agreement removes discriminatory barriers to procurements of supplies and services produced by industrial enterprises of the other country to the extent mutually beneficial and consistent with national laws, regulations, policies, and international obligations. This agreement does not cover construction or construction material. Latvia is already a designated country under the *WTO Government Procurement Agreement*.

DoD publishes trade agreements thresholds

On December 28, 2017, the Defense Acquisition Regulations System, Department of Defense (DoD) published in the *Federal Register* a <u>final rule</u> [Docket DARS-2017—0017] amending the *Defense Federal Acquisition Regulation Supplement* (DFARS) to incorporate revised thresholds for application of the *WTO Government Procurement Agreement* and the Free Trade Agreements, as determined by the United States Trade Representative. Commerce publishes limitation of duty-free imports of apparel articles assembled in Haiti under CBERA

On December 15, 2017, the International Trade Administration, Department of Commerce published in the *Federal Register* a <u>notification of annual quantitative limit</u> on imports of certain apparel from Haiti. The Caribbean Basin Economic Recovery Act (CBERA), as amended, provides duty-free treatment for certain apparel articles imported directly from Haiti. One of the preferences is known as the "value-added" provision, which requires that apparel meet a minimum threshold percentage of value added in Haiti, the United States, and/or certain beneficiary countries. The provision is subject to a quantitative limitation, which is calculated as a percentage of total apparel imports into the United States for each 12-month annual period. For the annual period from December 20, 2017 through December 19, 2018, the quantity of imports eligible for preferential treatment under the value-added provision is 361,603,399 square meters equivalent.

Singapore to use ASEAN Single Window for electronic Form D

On 9 November 2017, Singapore Customs issued <u>Circular 15/2017</u> announcing that Singapore, together with Indonesia, Malaysia and Viet Nam, will transit into the live operation of the ASEAN Single Window (ASW) for the electronic exchange of Form D under the ATIGA on 1 Jan 2018. The ASW is an environment that connects and integrates the National Single Windows (NSWs) of ASEAN Member States (AMSs), thereby allowing the electronic exchange of data between the AMSs. Under the live operation of the ASW for the exchange of Form D (the preferential Certificate of Origin (CO)) under the ATIGA, a Form D electronically transmitted (hereinafter referred to as "e-ATIGA Form D") from Singapore to any of the other 3 mentioned AMSs, for an import will continue to enjoy preferential tariff treatment. In order to enable the transmission of an e-ATIGA Form D, the exporter and, if it does not have access to TradeNet®, its declaring agent, must be pre-registered with Singapore Customs.

Singapore bars all commercially traded goods from N. Korea

On 7 November 2017, Singapore Customs issued <u>Circular 14/2017</u> which announces a prohibition from 8 November 2017, of all commercially traded goods that are imported, exported, transhipped or brought in transit from or to the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (N. Korea) through Singapore. For noncommercial transactions from or to the DPRK, the prohibition applies to goods that are sanctioned under the United Nations Security Council (UNSC) Resolutions 2371 (2017) and 2375 (2017) as published in the *Regulation of Imports and Exports (Amendment No. 2) Regulations 2017* which will also take effect on the same date (8 Nov 2017).

The circular states that:

Traders should note that any non-commercial goods which are imported from, exported or re-exported to, or transhipped or brought in transit from or to the DPRK

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through Singapore, would require a TradeNet® permit which should be submitted to Customs at least 3 working days before the intended date of shipment. Traders are also reminded to comply with all conditions stipulated in the approved permits. ***

Penaties

Under Regulation 6(1)(b) of the *Regulation of Imports and Exports Regulations*, the importation into, exportation from, and transhipment or transit through Singapore of any commercially traded goods and non-commercial goods which will contravene the decisions of the UNSC in resolutions made under Chapter VII of the United Nations Charter are prohibited.

Any person who contravenes any of these prohibitions shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable to -

- a) a fine of not exceeding S\$100,000 or 3 times the value of the goods in respect of which the offence was committed, whichever is the greater, or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding 2 years or to both, on the first conviction; and
- b) a fine of not exceeding \$\$200,000 or 4 times the value of the goods in respect of which the offence was committed, whichever is the greater, or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding 3 years or to both, on the second or subsequent conviction.

Commission updates list of dual use items

On 15 December 2017, the *Official Journal* published <u>Commission Delegated</u>
Regulation (EU) 2017/2268 of 26 September 2017 amending Council Regulation (EC) No 428/2009 setting up a Community regime for the control of exports, transfer, brokering and transit of dual-use items, which amends Annex I (which establishes the common list of dual-use items that are subject to controls in the Union), Annexes IIa to IIf (which establish Union General Export Authorisations), Annex IIg (which establishes a list of dual-use items that shall be excluded from the scope of national general export authorisations and Union General Export Authorisations) and Annex IV (which establishes authorisation requirements for

certain intra-Community transfers) to Regulation (EC) No 428/2009 to take into account dual-use items subject to controls within the framework of the Australia Group, the Missile Technology Control Regime, the Nuclear Suppliers Group, the Wassenaar Arrangement and the Chemical Weapons Convention. The Delegated Regulation came into force on 16 December 2017.

Annex I sets out a lengthy list of dual-use items which are controlled for export to outside the EU and is generally updated on an annual basis. The list of dual-use items set out in the Annex needs to stay current in order to ensure full compliance with international security obligations, guarantee transparency, maintain the Union competitiveness and facilitate references for export control authorities and economic operators. The update aligns the list with decisions taken within the framework of the international non-proliferation regimes and export control arrangements in 2016.

The majority of the changes this year result from amendments that were agreed in the Wassenaar Arrangement, including:

- An updated list of acronyms and abbreviations;
- New definitions for "biological agents" (Category 1), "Monolithic Microwave Integrate Circuit" (MMIC) (Categories 3 and 5) and "authentication" (Category 5 Part 2). The definition of "adapted for use in war" (Category 1) was removed;
- The restructuring of Category 5 Part 2 into a more positive control list of dual-use information security items. Note 4 (decontrol note to Category 5, Part 2) was removed, and is now incorporated in the 5A002.a. control entry; and
- The addition of new (sub-entry) controls in Category 3 for integrated circuits with analogue-to-digital converters (3A001.a.14.) and for MMIC transmit/receive modules (3A001.b.12.), and in Category 6 for certain lasers (6A005).

Changes were also made to reflect amendments to the Australia Group and Nuclear Suppliers Group lists.

The Missile Technology Control Regime was also changed. The changes included a new note to the 9D105 software control to highlight that this control includes software specially designed for a manned aircraft converted to operate as an unmanned aerial vehicle.

EU introduces legislation imposing targeted sanctions against Venezuela

Following on from a meeting of the EU Foreign Affairs Council ("FAC") on 13 November 2017, at which the FAC unanimously agreed to impose restrictive measures on Venezuela, on 14 November, the EU published in the *Official Journal Council Decision 2017/2074* and <u>Council Regulation (EU) 2017/2063</u> (together, the "Legislation"). The Legislation prescribes targeted sanctions against Venezuela, including an arms embargo, with immediate effect.

The Legislation has been formulated in response to the continuing crisis in Venezuela and the perceived deterioration of democracy, the rule of law and human

rights. In particular, the EU has expressed concern over the opaque and irregular election by which the Constituent Assembly was elected, and reported violations of human rights and fundamental freedoms. The EU therefore views the Legislation as a justified tool to help foster a credible and peaceful negotiated solution.

The Legislation has two primary aspects:

- 1. Extensive export restrictions against the Venezuelan regime. These consist of a tripartite embargo on the following:
 - Arms and related material of all types as well as the financing of military activities and provision of related services such as technical assistance;
 - Equipment which might be used for internal repression as well as financial assistance relating to such equipment and provision of related services such as technical assistance;
 - Equipment, technology or software intended primarily for use in telecommunications monitoring or interception by the Venezuelan regime, as well as financial or technical assistance to install, operate or update such equipment, technology or software.
- A legal framework for designated party controls, comprising travel bans and asset freezes, to be applied to persons who are responsible for (i) serious human rights violations; (ii) the repression of civil society and democratic opposition in Venezuela; or (ii) actions, policies or activities that otherwise undermine democracy or the rule of law.

At the time of publication, no designations of individuals or entities have been imposed by the EU. The Legislation states that a list of designated parties will be established and amended by the EU Council acting by unanimity upon a proposal by a Member State or the EU High Representative for Foreign Affairs and Security Policy.

The Legislation will remain in force until 14 November 2018, and will be kept under review. The EU reserves the right to renew or amend the Legislation as appropriate if the EU Council deems that its objectives have not been met.

Binding Tariff Information

The European Community has created the Binding Tariff Information (BTI) system as a tool to assist economic operators to obtain the correct tariff classification for goods they intend to import or export.

Binding Tariff Information is issued on request to economic operators by the customs authorities of the Member States. It is valid throughout the Community, regardless of the Member State which issued it. For information about an existing BTI, you may want to contact the customs administration of the Member

<u>State</u> which issued it. However, remember that, according to the provisions for data protection, there are limitations as to the information an administration can provide. You can search and consult existing BTIs on the <u>EBTI-database</u>.

UK DIT publishes Notice to exporters regarding new EU sanctions against Venezuela

On 15 November 2017, the Department for International Trade ("DIT")published Notice to exporters 2017/25 (the "Notice") in light of the new restrictive measures, including an arms embargo and internal repression related controls, imposed by the EU effective from 14 November 2017 (the "Measures"). Please see here for our previous blog post regarding introduction of the Measures. The Notice provides useful guidance to UK exporters on interpretation issues, as well as further detail on the restrictions from a practical perspective.

(a) Arms embargo

The Notice makes clear that the DIT Export Control Joint Unit ("ECJU") will interpret the arms embargo established by the Measures as applying to all items on the UK Military List.

(b) Equipment for monitoring communication

The Measures establish the following:

- A prohibition on the provision of telecommunication, internet monitoring or interception services to Venezuela's government or associated bodies, as well as on the supply of equipment, technology or software intended primarily for use in the monitoring or interception of internet or telephone communications in Venezuela.
- Ancillary prohibitions on the provision of related services, such as financial assistance related to the supply of these technologies to Venezuela or for use in Venezuela.

The Notice explains that a licence is required to undertake any of these prohibited actions. The ECJU will not grant such a licence if there are reasonable grounds to determine that the relevant items or services would be used primarily for internal repression, monitoring or interception by Venezuelan state actors, entities or anyone acting on their behalf.

The Measures also permit the ECJU to authorise transactions, prohibited by the arms embargo, which concern the execution of a contract or agreement concluded before 13 November 2017. Businesses seeking to rely on this exemption must notify the ECJU by Tuesday 21 November 2017 and provide a copy of the relevant contract in support of their licence application. The existence of a relevant contract does not however guarantee that the ECJU will grant a licence. Concurrently, the ECJU is reviewing all existing Venezuela related export and trade control licences in light of the new restrictions established by the Measures.

Licence applications must be submitted to the ECJU via SPIRE, the online export licensing system. The Notice makes clear the UK Government's willingness to prosecute in the event of serious and deliberate evasion of the Measures, and states that all UK companies are expected to comply with the Measures in full.

New Trade Bill enters Parliament; Customs Bill to follow

On 7 November 2017, the Department for International Trade (DIT) <u>announced</u> that the government is making crucial progress on the domestic legislation needed for Brexit, taking forward the next two Brexit Bills to Parliament. The announcement said:

The Trade Bill and the Customs Bill will allow the UK to set the groundwork to becoming an independent global trading nation, providing necessary certainty for businesses and international trading partners to make the most of this opportunity.

Key measures in the Trade Bill include provisions for the UK to implement existing EU trade agreements, helping ensure that UK companies can continue to access £1.3 trillion worth of major government contracts in other countries and creating a new trade remedies body to defend UK businesses against injurious trade practices.

Further tax-related elements of the UK's trade policy will be legislated in the Treasury's Customs Bill – Taxation (Cross-border Trade) Bill – as part of the creation of a new UK tariff regime. This includes the trade remedies and unilateral trade prefer-

ences which provide preferential trade access to UK markets for developing countries

The Bills follow engagement with stakeholders including the Scottish and Welsh Governments and Northern Ireland leaders after the Trade and Customs White Papers were published in October.

Trade Bill

The Trade Bill laid in Parliament on 7 November will:

- create powers to assist in the transition of over 40 existing trade agreements between the EU and other countries
- enable the UK to become an independent member of the Agreement on Government Procurement (GPA) ensuring UK companies have continued access to £1.3 trillion worth of government contracts and procurement opportunities in 47 countries
- establish a new independent UK body, the Trade Remedies Authority, to defend UK businesses against unfair trade practices
- ensure the UK Government has the legal abilities for gathering and sharing trade information

Customs Bill

The government also laid resolutions for the Customs Bill, which will enter Parliament shortly. The Bill will allow the government to create a standalone customs regime and amend the VAT and excise regimes. It will:

- charge and vary customs duty on goods
- specify which duties are payable on which goods
- set preferential or additional duties in certain circumstances for example, to support developing countries
- maintain a functioning movement of goods from the day we leave the EU by continuing the VAT and excise regimes in line with the final deal reached in negotiations

Implementation of VAT law and regulations – 1 January 2018

Federal <u>Decree-Law No. (8) of 2017 on Value Added Tax</u> and <u>Cabinet Decision No. (52) of 2017 on the Executive Regulations of VAT</u> come into effect on 1 January 2018. Pursuant to Article (3) of the VAT Decree Law, a standard VAT rate of 5% will be applicable on all supplies, import of goods and services, except those goods and services which are zero rated or exempt from VAT. Importers are responsible for paying the VAT on imported goods.

The Import value of Goods consists of:

- 1. The customs value pursuant to Customs Legislation, including the value of insurance, freight and any customs fees and Excise Tax paid on the Import of the Goods. Tax shall not be included in the Value of the Supply.
- 2. If it is not possible to determine the value pursuant to Clause (1) of this Article, the value shall be determined based on alternate valuation rules stated in the applicable Customs Legislation.

Goods shall not be treated as imported in the following situations:

- 1. a. Where they are under customs duty suspension arrangements in accordance with the GCC Common Customs Law, and subject to providing a financial guarantee or a cash deposit equal to the value of the Due Tax if and when requested by the Authority, in the following cases:
 - 1) Temporary admission
 - 2) Goods placed in a customs warehouse.
 - Goods in transit.
 - 4) imported Goods intended to be re-exported by the same Person.
- b. Imported into a Designated Zone from a place outside the State.
- 2. Tax shall not be due on any Import of Goods where they are under an exemption from Customs duty under the following categories in accordance with the GCC Common Customs Law:
 - a. Goods imported by the military forces, and internal security forces.
 - b. Personal effects and gifts accompanied by travellers.
- c. Used personal effect and household items transported by UAE nationals living abroad on return or expats moving to live in the UAE for first time.
 - d. Returned Goods.
- 3. Where a Person imported Goods to the State through another Implementing State the Tax will not be due on that Import, if the Authority establishes that Tax is due on the supply or transfer of Goods in that other Implementing State.
- 4. The Authority may specify procedures to be followed by Importers and Customs Departments in respect of the Import of Goods.

Exported goods shall be subject to the zero rate if the following conditions are met:

- 1. The Direct Export shall be subject to the zero rate if the following conditions are met:
- a. The Goods are physically exported to a place outside the Implementing States or are put into a customs suspension regime in accordance with GCC Common Customs Law within 90 days of the date of the supply.
- b. Official and commercial evidence of Export or customs suspension is retained by the exporter.
- 2. An Indirect Export shall be subject to the zero rate if the following conditions are met:
- a. The Goods are physically exported to a place outside the Implementing States or are put into a customs suspension regime in accordance with GCC Common Customs Law, within 90 days of the date of the supply under an arrangement agreed by the supplier and the Overseas Customer at or before the date of supply
- b. The Overseas Customer obtains official and commercial evidence of Export or customs suspension in accordance with GCC Common Customs Law, and provides the supplier with a copy of this.
- c. The Goods are not used or altered in the time between supply and Export or customs suspension, except to the extent necessary to prepare the Goods for Export or customs suspension.
- d. The Goods do not leave the State in the possession of a passenger or crew member of an aircraft or ship.
- 3. For the purposes of this Article, a movement of Goods into a Designated Zone from a place in the State or a supply of Goods to a Designated Zone shall not be considered an Export of those Goods

For other zero ratings and rules governing "designated zones", see <u>Cabinet Decision No.</u> (52) of 2017 on the Executive Regulations of VAT.
