CANADA

Canada announces intent to impose countermeasures against new US Sec. 232 tariffs on Canadian aluminum products

On August 8, 2020, the Department of Finance posted a "Notice of intent to impose countermeasures action against the United States in response to tariffs on Canadian aluminum products" and invited the public to comment no later than September 6, 2020, on the products originating in the United States that will be subject to countermeasures for the 10% additional duties announced by the US on August 6, 2020 (to take effect on August 16).

The products subject to countermeasures will be drawn from those listed in Table 1 below. Goods selected from Table 1 will be subject to a 10 per cent surtax.

These countermeasures will only apply to goods originating from the US, which shall be considered as those goods eligible to be marked as a good of the US in accordance with the <u>Determination of Country of Origin for the Purposes of Marking Goods (CUSMA Countries) Regulations.</u>

These countermeasures will take effect by September 16, 2020 and will remain in place until the US eliminates its tariffs against Canada. The countermeasures will not apply to US goods that are in transit to Canada on the day on which these countermeasures come into force.

The list of products outlined at the tariff item level in Table 1 should be read in conjunction with the Schedule to <u>Canada's Customs Tariff</u>.

President Trump issues a proclamation imposing 10% additional duties on certain Canadian aluminum under sec. 232

On August 6, 2020, President Trump issued Proclamation 10060 on Adjusting Imports of Aluminum Into the United States (published in the Federal Register August 14, 2020), which amended Proclamation 9704 of March 8, 2018 to impose a 10% additional ad valorem duty on imports from Canada of non-alloyed unwrought aluminum provided for in subheading 7601.10, Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States (HTS or HTSUS). The additional duty was imposed under sec. 232 of the Trade Expansion Act of 1962 and will take effect with respect to goods entered for consumption, or withdrawn from warehouse for consumption, on or after 12:01 a.m. eastern daylight time on August 16, 2020, and shall continue in effect, unless such actions are expressly reduced, modified, or terminated.

Any exclusion of aluminum articles from Canada granted by the Secretary of Commerce pursuant to clause 3 of Proclamation 9704, as amended, that has not expired shall be valid under the modifications to the HTSUS made by this proclamation. Previously granted exclusions that have expired may be renewed.

Any imports of non-alloyed unwrought aluminum articles from Canada provided for in subheading 7601.10 that were admitted into a United States foreign trade zone under "privileged foreign status" as defined in 19 CFR 146.41 prior to 12:01 a.m. eastern daylight time on August 16, 2020, shall be subject upon entry for consumption on or after such time and date to the 10 percent ad valorem rate of duty imposed by Proclamation 9704, as amended. Any imports of non-alloyed unwrought aluminum articles from Canada provided for in subheading 7601.10, except any articles that are eligible for admission under "domestic status" as defined in 19 CFR 146.43, that are admitted into a United States foreign trade zone on or after 12:01 a.m. eastern daylight time on August 16, 2020, shall be admitted only as "privileged foreign status" as defined in 19 CFR 146.41, and shall be subject upon entry for consumption on or after such time and date to the 10 percent ad valorem rate of duty imposed by Proclamation 9704, as amended.

Non-alloyed unwrought aluminum articles provided for in subheading 7601.10 shall not be subject upon entry for consumption to the duty established in clause 2 of Proclamation 9704, as amended, merely by reason of manufacture in a U.S. foreign trade zone. However, non-alloyed unwrought aluminum articles provided for in subheading 7601.10 admitted to a U.S. foreign trade zone in "privileged foreign status" pursuant to clause 5 of this proclamation, shall retain that status consistent with 19 CFR 146.41(e).

No drawback shall be available with respect to the duties imposed pursuant to this proclamation.

final report (USITC Pub. 5097) was submitted on August 10, 2020. Congress will ultimately decide whether to enact a Miscellaneous Tariff Bill.

Sec. 301 FU CIVIL AIRCRAFT

USTR modifies \$7.5 Billion WTO award implementation relating to illegal Airbus subsidies

On August 12, 2020, the US Trade Representative (USTR) issued a <u>press release</u> stating that, as required by U.S. law, the USTR is issuing a modification to the list of products subject to WTO-authorized additional duties in the United States' successful WTO challenge to subsidies for large civil aircraft provided by the European Union, France, Germany, Spain, and the United Kingdom. USTR is

removing from the tariff list certain products from Greece and the United Kingdom and adding an equivalent amount of trade from France and Germany. The changes are modest; the amount of products subject to countermeasures will remain unchanged at \$7.5 billion and the tariff rates will remain unchanged at 15% for aircraft and 25% for all other products.

"The EU and member states have not taken the actions necessary to come into compliance with WTO decisions," Ambassador Robert Lighthizer stated. "The United States, however, is committed to obtaining a long-term resolution to this dispute. Accordingly, the United States will begin a new process with the EU in an effort to reach an agreement that will remedy the conduct that harmed the U.S. aviation industry and workers and will ensure a level playing field for U.S. companies."

The modifications were published on August 18, 2020, in the Federal Register Notice of Modification of Section 301 Action: Enforcement of U.S. WTO Rights in Large Civil Aircraft Dispute. The <u>notice</u> [Docket No. USTR-2019-0003] indicated that the modifications (set out in Annex I to the notice) are applicable with respect to products that are entered for consumption, or withdrawn from warehouse for consumption, on or after 12:01 a.m. eastern daylight savings time on September 1, 2020.

In order to implement the USTR determination, effective September 1, 2020, subchapter III of chapter 99 of the HTSUS is modified by Annex 1 to this notice. The additional duties provided for in the HTSUS subheadings established by Annex 1 apply in addition to all other applicable duties, fees, exactions, and charges.

Any product listed in Annex 1 to the notice, except any product that is eligible for admission under 'domestic status' as defined in 19 CFR 146.43, which is subject to the additional duty imposed by USTR's determination, and is admitted into a US foreign trade zone on or after 12:01 a.m. eastern daylight savings time on September 1, 2020, only may be admitted as 'privileged foreign status' as defined in 19 CFR 146.41. Such products will be subject upon entry for consumption to any ad valorem rates of duty or quantitative limitations related to the classification under the applicable HTSUS subheading.

As stated in the February 21, 2020, notice, the USTRhs determined that the action may be revised as appropriate immediately upon any imposition of additional duties on US products in connection with the Large Civil Aircraft dispute or with the EU's WTO challenge to the alleged subsidization of US large civil aircraft.

Annex I provides:

Effective with respect to goods entered for consumption, or withdrawn from warehouse for consumption, on or after 12:01 a.m. eastern daylight time September 1, 2020, the following new tariff provisions are inserted in numerical sequence in subchapter III of chapter 99, with the material in the following new tariff provisions inserted in the columns entitled "Heading/Subheading", "Article Description", and "Rates of Duty 1-General", respectively:

Sec. 301 – China

USTR grants additional product exclusion extensions for Tranche 4A (\$300 billion action)

On August 28, 2020, the Office of the US Trade Representative (USTR) posted a notice that was subsequently published in the Federal Register on September 2, 2020, that extends eighty-seven Tranche 4A (\$300 billion action) product exclusions from September 1, 2020 through December 31, 2020, as set out in the Annexes to the notices. USTR has issued eight notices of product exclusions under this action. These exclusions are scheduled to expire on September 1, 2020. On June 26 (85 FR 38482), July 17 (85 FR 43639), and August 11, 2020 (85 FR 48595), the USTR invited the public to comment on whether to extend by up to 12 months, particular exclusions granted under the \$300 billion action. USTR has determined to extend the exclusions in the Annexes to this notice for less than 12 months - through December 31, 2020. The exclusions are available for any product that meets the description in the Annexes, regardless of whether the importer filed an exclusion request. Further, the scope of each exclusion is governed by the scope 6 of the ten-digit HTSUS headings and product descriptions in the Annexes to this notice, and not by the product descriptions set out in any particular request for exclusion.

The exclusions being extended were covered by US Notes 20(rr), (uu), (ww), (zz), (bbb), (ddd) and (fff), and were filed under tariff schedule subheadings 9903.88.39, 9903.88.42, 9903.88.44, 9903.88.47, 9903.88.49 and 9903.88.53.

In accordance with Annex A, paragraph A subparagraphs 1 and 2, the extended exclusions, now scheduled to expire Dec. 31, will be moved from the above tariff provisions to new US Note 20(jjj) and new subheading 9903.88.57. Subparagraphs 3 and 4 contain conforming amendments.

Annex B contains a list of the original product exclusions that are being extended. They were provided for in various subdivisions of US Note 20, and 9903.88.39, 9903.88.42, 9903.88.44, 9903.88.47, 9903.88.49, 9903.88.51 and 9903.88.53

USTR grants additional product exclusions for the \$200 billion action (Tranche 3)

On August 24, 2020, the Office of the US Trade Representative (USTR) published in the Federal Register a <u>notice</u> that announces the USTR's determination to grant certain exclusions and make technical amendments to previously announced exclusions. The product exclusions will apply from September 24, 2018 to August 7, 2020. The amendments announced in this notice are retroactive to the date the original exclusions were published and do not extend the period for the original exclusions. US Customs and Border Protection (CBP) will issue instructions on entry guidance and implementation.

As set forth in the Annex to the notice, the exclusions are reflected in two specially prepared product descriptions that respond to two exclusion requests. The exclusions are available for any products that meet the description in the Annex, regardless of whether the importer benefitting from the product exclusion filed an exclusion request. Further, the scope of an exclusion is governed by the scope of the product descriptions in the Annex and not by the product description found in any particular request for exclusion

With respect to goods entered for consumption, or withdrawn from warehouse for consumption, on or after 12:01 a.m. EDT on September 24, 2018, and before August 7, 2020, paragraph A of the Annex modifies US note 20 (aaa) to subchapter III of chapter 99 of the Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States (HTSUS) is modified by inserting the following exclusions in numerical order after exclusion (79):

- (80) Wallets, whether or not with wrist straps, of reinforced plastics, each measuring at least 17.5 cm long by 2 cm wide by 11 cm high and not more than 19 cm long by 2 cm wide by 11 cm high (described in statistical reporting number 4202.32.1000)
- (81) Mixtures containing N,N-dimethyldodecan-1-amine (CAS No. 112-18-5) and N,N-dimethyltetradecan-1-amine (CAS No. 112-75-4) (described in statistical reporting number 3824.99.9297)

Paragraph B of the Annex [mistakenly referred to as Paragraph A in Section C of the notice] contains eight technical amendments to U.S. note 20(qq)(100), U.S. note 20(II)(17), and U.S. notes 20(yy)(78)-(83) to subchapter III of chapter 99 of the HTSUS, as set out in the Annexes of the notices published at 84 FR 57803 (October 28, 2019), 85 FR 6674 (February 5, 2020), and 85 FR 27489 (May 8, 2020).

USTR amends a product exclusion under the \$16 billion action (Tranche 2)

On August 13, 2020, the Office of the US Trade Representative (USTR) published in the Federal Register a <u>notice</u> that announces the USTR's determination to make an amendment to a previously granted exclusion. The amendment is retroactive to the date the original exclusion was published and does not extend the period for the original exclusion. US Customs and Border Protection will issue instructions on entry guidance and implementation.

Subparagraph A of the Annex to the notice makes one technical amendment to US note 20(o)(63) to subchapter III of chapter 99 of the HTSUS, as set out in the Annexes of the notices published at 84 FR 37381 (July 31, 2019).

Effective with respect to goods entered for consumption, or withdrawn from warehouse for consumption, on or after 12:01 a.m. EDT on August 23, 2018: US note 20(o)(63) to subchapter III of chapter 99 of the HTSUS, as modified by 85 FR 43291 (July 16, 2020), Annex B(1), is further modified by deleting "Digital clinical thermometers, valued not over \$11 each" and inserting "Digital clinical thermometers" in lieu thereof.

USTR amends a product exclusion under the \$34 billion action (Tranche 1)

On August 13, 2020, the Office of the US Trade Representative (USTR) published in the Federal Register a <u>notice</u> that announces the USTR's determination to make a technical amendment to a previously granted exclusion. The amendment is retroactive to the date the original exclusion was published and does not extend the period for the original exclusion. US Customs and Border Protection will issue instructions on entry guidance and implementation.

Paragraph A of the Annex makes one technical amendment to US note 20(x)(21) to subchapter III of chapter 99 of the HTSUS, as set out in the Annex of the notice published at 85 FR 7816 (February 11, 2020).

• Effective with respect to goods entered for consumption, or withdrawn from warehouse for consumption, on or after 12:01 a.m. EDT on July 6, 2018: 1. US note 20(x)(21) to subchapter III of chapter 99 of the HTSUS, is modified by deleting "operating weight of 19.1 t (42,000 lbs.)" and inserting "operating weight of at least 19 t but no more than 19.2 t (at least 41,887 lbs.- but not more than 42,329 lbs.)" in lieu thereof.

USTR seeks comments on extending exclusions under the \$300 billion action

On August 11, 2020, the Office of the US Trade Representative (USTR) published in the Federal Register a <u>notice and requests for comments</u> [Docket Number USTR-2020-0031] relating to the consideration of a possible extension for up to 12 months of particular exclusions from the Tranche 4A action (\$300 billion) on goods from China. The USTR initiated a product exclusion process in October 2019, and has issued seven product exclusion notices under this action and is issuing an eighth notice concurrent with this notice. The product exclusions granted under these notices are scheduled to expire on September 1, 2020. The USTR decided to consider a possible extension of particular exclusions granted under the first seven product exclusion notices. This notice announces the USTR's decision to consider a possible extension of particular exclusions granted under the eighth notice of product exclusions.

Comments must be submitted via the <u>USTR on-line portal</u>. The public portal will open for comments on August 5, 2020. To be assured of consideration, submit written comments on the public docket by August 20, 2020 at 11:59 pm (ET). The notice has the comment form (annex), data required and evaluation criteria.

USTR publishes new extensions for Tranche 3 (\$200 billion)

On August 11, 2020, the Office of the US Trade Representative (USTR) published in the Federal Register a <u>notice</u> that announces the USTR's determination to extend certain exclusions through December 31, 2020, as specified in the Annex to the notice. The USTR initiated the exclusion process on June 24, 2019, and has granted 15 sets of exclusions under the \$200 billion action. These exclusions will expire on August 7, 2020. On May 6, 2020 and June 3, 2020, the USTR established a processes for the public to comment on whether to extend particular exclusions granted under the \$200 billion action for up to 12 months. This notice announces USTR's determination to extend certain exclusions through December 31, 2020. The product exclusion extensions announced in the notice will apply as of August 7, 2020, and extend through December 31, 2020. US Customs and Border Protection will issue instructions on entry guidance and implementation.

The \$200 billion extension notices provided that the USTR would consider extensions of up to 12 months. In light of the cumulative effect of current and possible future exclusions or extensions of exclusions on the effectiveness of the action taken in this investigation, the USTR has determined to extend the exclusions in the Annex to the notice for less than 12 months – through December 31, 2020. To date, the USTR has granted more than 6,700 exclusion requests, has extended some of these exclusions, and may consider further extensions of exclusions. Furthermore, more than 200 requests are pending on the products covered by the action taken on August 20, 2019. The USTR will take account of the cumulative effect of exclusions in considering the possible further extension of the exclusions covered by this notice, as well as possible extensions of exclusions of other products covered by the action in this investigation. The USTR's determination also takes into account advice from advisory committees and any public comments concerning extension of the pertinent exclusion. In accordance with the June 24 notice, the exclusions are available for any product that meets the description in the Annex, regardless of whether the importer filed an exclusion request. Further, the scope of each exclusion is governed by the scope of the ten-digit HTSUS headings and product descriptions in the Annex to this notice, and not by the product descriptions set out in any particular request for exclusion.

- Annex A, paragraph A, subparagraphs (1)-(2) establish a new heading 9903.88.56, HTS and a new U.S. note 20 (iii) to subchapter III of chapter 99, HTS in numerical sequence with 266 extensions.
- Subparagraphs (3)-(6) of Paragraph A to Annex A contain conforming amendments to the HTSUS reflecting the modifications made by the Annex.
- Annex B has an informational table that contains a list of the original product exclusions that are being extended by the notice. The original product exclusions were provided for in various subdivisions in note 20 to subchapter III of chapter 99 and an associated 9903.88 heading. In addition, the table contains the corresponding subdivisions in new note 20(iii) to subchapter III of chapter 99 and new heading 9903.88.56 for the product exclusions that are being extended by this notice.

USTR publishes new exclusions for Tranche 4A (\$300 billion)

On August 11, 2020, the Office of the US Trade Representative (USTR) published in the Federal Register a <u>notice</u> that announces the USTR's determination to grant certain exclusion requests, as specified in the Annex to the notice, and make certain amendments to previously announced exclusions. The product exclusions announced in the notice apply as of September 1, 2019, the effective date of List 1 of the \$300 billion action, and extend to September 1, 2020.

As set out in the Annex, the exclusions are reflected in one existing ten-digit HTSUS subheading and 9 specially prepared product descriptions, which together respond to 25 separate exclusion requests. In accordance with the October 24 notice, the exclusions are available for any product that meets the description in the Annex, regardless of whether the importer filed an exclusion request. Further, the scope of each exclusion is governed by the scope of the tendigit HTSUS subheading as described in the Annex, and not by the product descriptions set out in any particular request for exclusion.

 Annex Paragraph A, Subparagraphs (1)–(2) establish a new heading 9903.88.55 and a new U.S. note 20(hhh) to subchapter III of chapter 99. Paragraph A, subparagraphs (3)-(4) of the Annex contain conforming amendments to the HTSUS reflecting the modifications made by the Annex.

USTR seeks comments to the HTS on extending exclusions expiring in October 2020 (\$34 Billion) Action

On August 3, 2020, the Office of the US Trade Representative published in the Federal Register a <u>notice and request for comments</u> [Docket No. USTR–2020–0030] relating to the consideration of a possible extension for up to 12 months of particular exclusions from the Tranche 1 (\$34 Billion) action scheduled to expire in October 2020. Accordingly, USTR invites public comments on whether to extend particular exclusions scheduled to expire on October 2, 2020, that were granted under the following notices of product exclusions: 84 FR 52567 (October 2, 2019); 84 FR 69016 (December 17, 2019); and 85 FR 7816 (February 11, 2020).

USTR will evaluate the possible extension of each exclusion on a case-by-case basis. The focus of the evaluation will be whether, despite the first imposition of these additional duties in July 2018, the particular product remains available only from China. In addressing this factor, commenters should address specifically:

- Whether the particular product and/or a comparable product is available from sources in the United States and/or in third countries.
- Any changes in the global supply chain since July 2018 with respect to the particular product or any other relevant industry developments.
- The efforts, if any, the importers or U.S. purchasers have undertaken since July 2018 to source the product from the United States or third countries.

In addition, USTR will continue to consider whether the imposition of additional duties on the products covered by the exclusion will result in severe economic harm to the commenter or other U.S. interests.

The procedures for registration and comment may be found in the Federal Register notice.

CBP GUIDANCE - SEC. 232

CBP issues guidance on Sec. 232 additional duties on Canadian Aluminum

On August 13, 2020, CBP issued <u>CSMS #43654621 - GUIDANCE: Additional Duty Under Section 232 on Imports of Aluminum Articles from Canada</u>, which is reproduced below:

BACKGROUND

On March 8, 2018, the President issued Proclamation 9704 on Adjusting Imports of Aluminum into the United States, under Section 232 of the Trade Expansion Act of 1962, as amended (19 U.S.C. 1862), providing for additional import duties for aluminum articles, effective March 23, 2018.

On August 6, 2020, the President issued a Presidential Proclamation on Adjusting Imports of Aluminum Into the United States, announcing that certain aluminum articles imported under Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States (HTSUS) subheading 7601.10 that are the products of Canada will be subject to the additional 10 percent ad valorem rate of duty.

The increased rates of duty on certain aluminum articles that are the products of Canada are effective with respect to goods entered, or withdrawn from warehouse for consumption, on or after 12:01 a.m. eastern daylight time on August 16, 2020.

The functionality for the acceptance of the 232 additional duties on aluminum articles that are the products of Canada will be available in the Automated Commercial Environment (ACE) as of 7 am eastern standard time, August 16, 2020.

GUIDANCE

In addition to reporting the regular HTSUS classification under subheading 7601.10, importers shall report the following HTSUS classification for imported merchandise subject to the additional duty:

 9903.85.21 (10% ad valorem duty rate for non-alloyed unwrought aluminum products of Canada, provided for in subheading 7601.10)

FOREIGN TRADE ZONES

Any imports of non-alloyed unwrought aluminum articles that are the products of Canada provided for in subheading 7601.10, except any articles that are eligible for admission under "domestic status" as defined in 19 CFR 146.43, that are admitted into a United States foreign trade zone on or after 12:01 a.m. eastern daylight time on August 16, 2020, shall be admitted only as "privileged foreign status" as defined in 19 CFR 146.41, and shall be subject upon entry for consumption on or after such time and date to the 10 percent ad valorem rate of duty imposed by Proclamation 9704, as amended.

Any imports of non-alloyed unwrought aluminum articles from Canada provided for in subheading 7601.10 that were admitted into a United States foreign trade zone under "privileged foreign status" as defined in 19 CFR 146.41 prior to 12:01 a.m. eastern daylight time on August 16, 2020, shall be subject upon entry for consumption on or after such time and date to the 10 percent ad valorem rate of duty imposed by Proclamation 9704, as amended.

Non-alloyed unwrought aluminum articles provided for in subheading 7601.10 shall not be subject upon entry for consumption to the duty established in clause 2 of Proclamation 9704, as amended, merely by reason of manufacture in a U.S. foreign trade zone. However, non-alloyed unwrought aluminum articles provided for in subheading 7601.10 admitted to a U.S. foreign trade zone in "privileged foreign status" pursuant to clause 5 of the August 6 proclamation, shall retain that status consistent with 19 CFR 146.41(e).

PRODUCTS ENTERED UNDER ANY FREE TRADE AGREEMENT OR PREFERENCE PROGRAMS

For any such products that are eligible for special tariff treatment under any of the free trade agreements or preference programs listed in general note 3(c)(i) to the tariff schedule, the duty provided in heading 9903.85.21 shall be collected in addition to any special rate of duty otherwise applicable under the appropriate tariff subheading, except where prohibited by law.

PRODUCTS ENTERED UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF CHAPTER 98, HTSUS

Goods for which entry is claimed under a provision of chapter 98 and which are subject to the additional duties prescribed herein shall be eligible for and subject to the terms of such provisions and applicable CBP regulations, except that duties under subheading 9802.00.60 shall be assessed based upon the full value of the imported articles.

DRAWBACK

No drawback shall be available with respect to the additional Section 232 aluminum duties imposed.

EXCLUSIONS

Any exclusion of aluminum articles of Canada granted by the Secretary of Commerce that has not expired shall be valid under the modifications made by the August 6, 2020, Proclamation.

OTHER PROVISIONS

No claim for entry or for any duty exemption or reduction shall be allowed for the aluminum products enumerated in this paragraph under a provision of chapter 99 that may set forth a lower rate of duty or provide duty-free treatment, taking into account information supplied by CBP, but any additional duty prescribed in any provision of this subchapter or subchapter IV of chapter 99 shall be imposed in addition to the duty in heading 9903.85.21.

CBP GUIDANCE - Sec. 301 - EU AIRCRAFT DISPUTE

CBP issues updated guidance on Sec. 301 Large Civil Aircraft Dispute

On August 27, 2020, CBP issued <u>CSMS #43784137 - UPDATED GUIDANCE:</u> <u>Modification of Section 301 Action: Enforcement of U.S. World Trade Organization (WTO) Rights in Large Civil Aircraft Dispute which is reproduced below:</u>

UPDATE: The list of affected products attached to this message has been revised.

BACKGROUND

On October 18, 2019, the USTR imposed additional duties on certain products of the European Union (EU) and certain EU member States in this Section 301 investigation to enforce U.S. WTO rights in the Large Civil Aircraft (LCA) Dispute. See <u>84 FR</u> <u>54245</u>. On December 12, 2019, the USTR announced a review of the Section 301 action and requested public comments.

On February 21, 2020, based on this review, the USTR published a Modification to the LCA Dispute in <u>84 FR 10204</u> to revise the action being taken by increasing the rate of additional duties on certain LCA, and by modifying the list of other products of certain current and former EU member States subject to additional 25 percent duties.

On June 26, 2020, the USTR published a notice announcing another review of the action and establishing a docket to receive public comments. The June 26 notice included a proposal to impose additional duties of up to 100 percent on a new list of products of France, Germany, Spain, and the United Kingdom, covered by 30 tariff subheadings with an approximate annual trade value of \$3.1 billion. See <u>85 FR</u> 38488 (June 26, 2020) and <u>85 FR</u> 39661 (July 1, 2020).

On August 18, 2020, the USTR published a Modification to the LCA Dispute in <u>85 FR 50866</u>, to modify the list of products subject to additional duties of 25 percent ad valorem, effective on or after 12:01 a.m. September 1, 2020.

The modifications to the Section 301 action announced in <u>85 FR 50866</u> are in accordance with the statutory objective, and take into account the public comments, any advice of advisory committees, and the advice of the Section 301 committee. In accordance with section 306(b)(2)(F) of the Trade Act of 1974 (19 U.S.C. 2416(b)(2)(F)), the revised action includes reciprocal goods of the affected industry. The annual trade value of the tariff subheadings subject to additional duties under the revised action remains at approximately \$7.5 billion, which is consistent with the WTO Arbitrator's finding on the appropriate level of countermeasures.

GUIDANCE

The modifications set out in Annex 1 to <u>85 FR 50866</u> identify the products affected by the revised action, the rate of duty to be assessed, and the current or former EU member States affected. Annex 2, section 1, contains the unofficial descriptive list of the revisions made by <u>85 FR 50866</u>. Annex 2, section 2, contains an unofficial, consolidated description of the action, reflecting the changes in Annex 1.

As specified in Annex 1, the USTR has determined to alter the composition of the list of non-aircraft products subject to the modifications to the Section 301 action set out in Annex 1. These modifications are applicable with respect to products that are entered for consumption, or withdrawn from warehouse for consumption, on or after 12:01 a.m. eastern daylight savings time on September 1, 2020. A complete list of products subject to the remedy and assessed duties are set out in FR notice 85 FR 50866. For ease of reference, the complete list of affected products, countries of origin, Chapter 99 HTSUS numbers, and the associated effective dates and tariff rates is attached to the end of this memorandum.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

With the exception of any product that is eligible for admission under 'domestic status' as defined in 19 CFR 146.43, any product listed in Annex 1 that is subject to the additional duty imposed by this determination, and is admitted into a U.S. foreign trade zone on or after 12:01 a.m. eastern daylight time on September 1, 2020, may only be admitted under 'privileged foreign status' as defined in 19 CFR 146.41. Such products will be subject upon entry for consumption to any ad valorem rates of duty or quantitative limitations related to the classification under the applicable HTSUS subheading.

Reminder: When importers, brokers, and/or filers are submitting an entry summary in which a heading or subheading in Chapter 99 is claimed on imported merchandise, refer them to <u>CSMS 39587858</u> (Entry Summary Order of Reporting for Multiple HTS when 98 or 99 HTS are required).

CBP issues guidance on Sec. 301 Tranche 3 (\$200 billion) product exclusion extensions

On August 17, 2020 CBP issued <u>CSMS #43687570 - GUIDANCE: Section 301</u> <u>China Tranche 3 - \$200B Product Exclusion Extensions</u>, which is reproduced below [Updated on Aug. 24, 2020 in CSMS #43751936]:

BACKGROUND

On August 11, 2020, the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR) published Federal Register (FR) Notice <u>85 FR 48600</u>, extending certain product exclusions previously covered by FR Notices <u>84 FR 38717</u>, <u>84 FR 49591</u>, <u>84 FR 57803</u>, <u>84 FR 61674</u>, <u>84 FR 65882</u>, <u>84 FR 69012</u>, <u>85 FR 549</u>, <u>85 FR 6674</u>, <u>85 FR 9921</u>, <u>85 FR 15015</u>, <u>85 FR 17158</u>, <u>85 FR 23122</u>, <u>85 FR 27489</u>, <u>85 FR 32094</u>, <u>85 FR 38000</u>, and <u>85 FR 42968</u>from Section 301 related to goods from China (Tranche 3 - \$200B Action).

The extension relates to the imposed additional duties announced in <u>83 FR 47974</u> on Chinese goods with an annual trade value of approximately \$200 billion.

The product exclusion extension will apply as of August 7, 2020, and will extend through December 31, 2020.

The functionality for the acceptance of the imported merchandise covered by the extension of product exclusions that were previously covered under multiple product exclusion rounds from China excluded from the Section 301 (Tranche 3 - \$200B Action) duty will be available in the Automated Commercial Environment (ACE) as of 7 a.m. eastern daylight time, August 20, 2020.

GUIDANCE

Instructions for importers, brokers, and filers on submitting entries to CBP containing granted exclusions by the USTR from the Section 301 measures are set out below:

Per <u>85 FR 48600</u>, in addition to reporting the regular Chapter 3, 8, 16, 28, 29, 32, 34, 37, 38, 39, 40, 42, 44, 48, 50, 51, 54, 55, 56, 57, 58, 60, 65, 68, 69, 70, 73, 75, 76, 82, 83, 84, 85, 87, 90, 91, and 94 classifications of the

HTSUS for the imported merchandise, as of August 7, 2020, importers shall report the HTSUS classification 9903.88.56 (Articles, the product of China, as provided for in U.S. note 20(iii) to this subchapter, each covered by an exclusion granted by the USTR for imported merchandise subject to the exclusion).

 Importers shall not submit the corresponding Chapter 99 HTS number for the Section 301 duties when HTS 9903.88.56 is submitted.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Imports which have been granted a product exclusion from the Section 301 measures, and which are not subject to the Section 301 duties, are not covered by the Foreign Trade Zone (FTZ) provisions of the Section 301 Federal Register notices, but instead are subject to the FTZ provisions in 19 CFR part 146.

To request a refund of Section 301 duties paid on previous imports of products granted duty exclusions by the USTR, importers may file a Post Summary Correction (PSC) if within the PSC filing timeframe. If the entry is beyond the PSC filing timeframe, importers may protest the liquidation if within the protest filing timeframe. The latest guidance on the process for submitting retroactive claims for product exclusions to CBP is found in CSMS 42566154.

In situations where an importer has requested a product exclusion and the request is pending with the USTR, importers or their licensed representative may submit a request to extend the liquidation of impacted unliquidated entry summaries to CBP.

On August 13, 2020, CBP issued <u>CSMS #43656381 - GUIDANCE: Section 301 Tranche 4A - \$300B Ninth Round of Product Exclusions from China</u>, which is reproduced below:

BACKGROUND

On August 11, 2020, the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR) published Federal Register (FR) Notice <u>85 FR 48627</u> on certain exclusions from the Section 301 duty related to goods from China (Tranche 4A - \$300B Action).

These product exclusions relate to the imposed additional duties announced in <u>84 FR 43304</u> and <u>84 FR 45821</u> on goods covered under list 1/Annex A Tranche 4A - \$300B Action).

The product exclusions will retroactively apply as of the September 1, 2019 effective date of the \$300 billion action (Tranche 4A), and will extend through September 1, 2020

The exclusions are available for any product that meets the description as set out in the Annex to <u>85 FR 48627</u>, regardless of whether the importer filed an exclusion request. Further, the scope of each exclusion is governed by the scope of the Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States (HTSUS) 10-digit headings and product descriptions provided in the Annex to <u>85 FR 48627</u>, not by the product descriptions set out in any particular request for exclusion.

The functionality for the acceptance of the imported merchandise covered under the ninth round of products from China excluded from the Section 301 Tranche 4A-\$300B Action will be available in the Automated Commercial Environment (ACE) as of 7 a.m. eastern daylight time, August 20, 2020.

GUIDANCE

Instructions for importers, brokers, and filers on submitting entries to Customs and Border Protection (CBP) containing products granted exclusions from the Section 301 measures as set out in <u>85 FR 48627</u> are provided below.

- Articles from China, as provided for in U.S. note 20(hhh) to this subchapter, will be covered by the exclusion granted by the USTR for imported merchandise that is subject to the exclusion and for which the exclusion is claimed.
- In addition to reporting the regular Chapters 39, 70, 84, and 95 classifications of the HTSUS for the imported merchandise as listed in <u>85 FR 48627</u>, importers shall report the HTSUS classification of 9903.88.55.
- Importers shall not submit the corresponding Chapter 99 HTS number for the Section 301 duties when HTS 9903.88.55 is submitted.

CBP issues guidance on Tranche 2 (\$16 billion) extensions of first round exclusions

On August 7, 2020, CBP issued <u>CSMS #43600625 - GUIDANCE: Section 301</u> <u>Tranche 2 - \$16B Action Extension of First Round of Product Exclusions from China, which is reproduced below:</u>

BACKGROUND

On July 30, 2020, the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR) published Federal Register (FR) Notice <u>85 FR 45949</u> to extend through December 31, 2020 certain product exclusions previously covered by the July 31, 2019 notice (see <u>84 FR 37381</u>) for Section 301 duties on China (Tranche 2 - \$16B Action).

These product exclusions relate to the imposed additional duties on Chinese goods with an annual trade value of approximately \$16 billion. Duty exclusions granted by USTR for the extension are effective with respect to entries on or after July 31, 2020 and extend through December 31, 2020.

The functionality for the acceptance of the extended product exclusions will be available in ACE as of 7 am eastern standard time, August 6, 2020.

GUIDANCE

Instructions for importers, brokers, and filers on submitting entries to CBP containing granted exclusions by the USTR from the Section 301 measures are set out below:

- Per 85 FR 45949, in addition to reporting the regular Chapter 39, 84, 85, 87, and 90 classifications of the HTSUS for the imported merchandise, as of July 31, 2020, importers shall report the HTSUS classification 9903.88.54 (Articles, the product of China, as provided for in U.S. note 20(ggg) to this subchapter, each covered by an exclusion granted by the USTR for imported merchandise subject to the exclusion).

CUSTOMS, IMPORTS AND FOREIGN TRADE ZONES

Temporary travel restrictions applicable to land ports of entry and ferries between the US and Canada or Mexico continued

On August 21, 2020, US Customs and Border Protection published in the Federal Register a <u>notice</u> that announces the decision of the Secretary of Homeland Security (Secretary) to continue until September 21, 2020, to temporarily limit the travel of individuals from Canada into the United States at land ports of entry along the United States-Canada border. Such travel will be limited to "essential travel," as further defined in the document.

In a <u>separate notice</u> published in the Federal Register on August 21, 2020, CBP announced the decision of the Secretary to continue until September 21, 2020, to temporarily limit the travel of individuals from Mexico into the United States at land ports of entry along the United States-Mexico border. Such travel will be limited to "essential travel," as further defined in the document.

The term, "essential travel," includes, but is not limited to—

U.S. citizens and lawful permanent residents returning to the United States;

- Individuals traveling for medical purposes (e.g., to receive medical treatment in the United States);
- Individuals traveling to attend educational institutions;
- Individuals traveling to work in the United States (e.g., individuals working in the farming or agriculture industry who must travel between the United States and Canada or Mexico in furtherance of such work);
- Individuals traveling for emergency response and public health purposes (e.g., government officials or emergency responders entering the United States to support federal, state, local, tribal, or territorial government efforts to respond to COVID-19 or other emergencies);
- Individuals engaged in lawful cross-border trade (e.g., truck drivers supporting the movement of cargo between the United States and Canada or Mexico);
- Individuals engaged in official government travel or diplomatic travel;
- Members of the U.S. Armed Forces, and the spouses and children of members of the U.S. Armed Forces, returning to the United States; and
- Individuals engaged in military-related travel or operations.

The following travel does not fall within the definition of "essential travel" for purposes of this Notification—

 Individuals traveling for tourism purposes (e.g., sightseeing, recreation, gambling, or attending cultural events).

At this time, this Notification does not apply to air, freight rail, or sea travel between the United States and Canada or Mexico, but does apply to passenger rail, passenger ferry travel, and pleasure boat travel between the United States and Canada or Mexico.

Nigeria requests cultural property protection under Art. 9 of the 1970 UNESCO Convention

On August 20, 2020, the US Department of State published in the Federal Register a notice [Public Notice: 11185] of receipt of request from Nigeria for cultural property protection under Article 9 of the 1970 UNESCO Convention on the Means of Prohibiting and Preventing the Illicit Import, Export and Transfer of Ownership of Cultural Property. Nigeria's request seeks US import restrictions on archaeological and ethnological material representing Nigeria's cultural patrimony. A public summary of Nigeria's request and information about U.S. implementation of the 1970 UNESCO This document is scheduled to be published in the Federal Register on 08/20/2020 and available online at federalregister.gov/d/2020-18266, and on govinfo.gov Convention will be available at the Cultural Heritage Center web site.

State proposes to extend Cultural Property Agreement between the United States and Greece

On August 20, 2020, the US Department of State published in the Federal Register a notice [Public Notice: 11186] to extend the *Memorandum of Understanding Concerning the Imposition of Import Restrictions on Categories of Archaeological and Byzantine Ecclesiastical Ethnological Material Through the 15th Century A.D. of the Hellenic Republic.* A copy of the Memorandum of Understanding, the Designated List of categories of material restricted from import into the United States, and related information can be found at the Cultural Heritage Center web site.

CBP to require goods from Hong Kong to be marked "China" for country of origin purposes

On August 11, 2020, US Customs and Border Protection (CBP) published in the Federal Register a general notice [CBP Dec. 20-15] that notifies the public that, in light of the President's Executive Order 13936 on Hong Kong Normalization, issued on July 14, 2020, suspending the application of section 201(a) of the *United States-Hong Kong Policy Act of 1992* to the marking statute, section 304 of the *Tariff Act of 1930* (19 U.S.C. 1304), with respect to imported goods produced in Hong Kong, such goods may no longer be marked to indicate "Hong Kong" as their origin, but must be marked to indicate "China."

The position set forth in this document is applicable as of July 29, 2020. A transition period will be granted for importers to implement marking consistent with this position for imported goods produced in Hong Kong. Such goods, when entered or withdrawn from warehouse for consumption into the United States after September 25, 2020, must be marked to indicate that their origin is "China" for purposes of 19 U.S.C. 1304. On August 21, 2020, CBP issued CSMS #43729326-GUIDANCE: Additional 45-day Compliance Period for Executive Order 13936 — Hong Kong Normalization, which extends the transition period for an additional 45 days — until November 9, 2020.

19 U.S.C. 1304 provides that, unless excepted, every article of foreign origin (or its container) imported into the United States shall be marked in a conspicuous place as legibly, indelibly, and permanently as the nature of the article (or its container) will permit, in such a manner as to indicate to the ultimate purchaser in the United States the English name of the country of origin of the article. Failure to mark an article in accordance with the requirements of 19 U.S.C. 1304 shall result in the levy of a duty of ten percent *ad valorem*. 19 C.F.R. Part 134 implements the country of origin marking requirements and exceptions of 19 U.S.C. 1304.

On June 5, 1997, immediately prior to the handover from Great Britain to the People's Republic of China (China), the US Customs Service (CBP's predecessor agency) issued a Federal Register notice that goods produced in Hong Kong should continue to be marked to indicate their origin as "Hong Kong" under 19 U.S.C. 1304 after Hong Kong's reversion to the sovereignty of China on July 1, 1997. See 62 FR 30927 (June 5, 1997).

 CSMS #43633412 - GUIDANCE: New Marking Rules for Goods Made in Hong Kong – Executive Order 13936

CBP posts FAQs on Marking Goods of Hong Kong

CBP has posted <u>Frequently Asked Questions - Guidance on Marking of Goods of Hong Kong – Executive Order 13936</u> on its website. The FAQs state that:

- Goods that are not marked properly after the transition period may be brought into a Foreign Trade Zone to be properly marked under a permit to manipulate issued by the Port Director.
- Similarly, goods which are improperly or falsely marked may be brought into an FTZ under a permit to manipulate to correct or remove such marking so as to comply with the laws and regulations (19 CFR 134.13(b)).
- The change in marking requirements does not affect country of origin determinations for purposes of assessing ordinary duties under Chapters 1-97 of the HTSUS or temporary or additional duties under Chapter 99 of the

HTSUS. Therefore, goods that are products of Hong Kong should continue to report International Organization for Standardization (ISO) country code "HK" as the country of origin when required.

- This rule only applies to marking requirements under 19 U.S.C. 1304. Entry summary procedures have not changed. Filers should continue to file their entry summaries and duty payments according to current regulation and policy.
- CBP's FRN affects marking requirements not country of origin. There is no change with regard to the Outward Processing Arrangements (OPA).

CBP issues interim rule for inbound express mail fees

On August 4, 2020, US Customs and Border Protection (CBP) published in the Federal Register an interim final rule that amends the CBP regulations to implement new subsection 13031(b)(9)(D) of the *Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act* (COBRA), as amended by section 8002 of the *Synthetics Trafficking and Overdose Prevention Act of 2018* (STOP Act), which establishes a new fee for processing Inbound Express Mail Service items (Inbound EMS items), initially set as \$1 per item. The USPS will collect the \$1 processing fee for each Inbound EMS item from foreign postal operators and USPS will pay 50 percent of this fee to CBP after settlement with foreign postal operators has occurred on a quarterly basis. USPS is to retain the other 50 percent to reimburse it for services it provided in connection with the processing of Inbound EMS items.

The COBRA, as amended, requires, among other things, that Inbound EMS items that are formally entered are also subject to a merchandise processing fee, if applicable, and requires the Secretary of the Treasury to issue regulations regarding USPS's quarterly remittances to CBP. This rule also makes conforming amendments to CBP regulations. This interim final rule is effective on August 4, 2020, except for the amendment to 19 C.F.R. § 24.23(c)(1)(v) which is effective September 3, 2020. Comments must be received on or before October 5, 2020.

EXPORT CONTROLS AND SANCTIONS

FEMA extends duration of restrictions on exports of PPE and modifies products covered

On August 10, 2020, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) issued a <u>temporary final rule</u> extending and modifying FEMA's previously imposed restrictions on the export from the United States of certain personal protective equipment (PPE Products) used in the response to the COVID-19 pandemic ("Extension Rule"). The <u>original restrictions</u> on exports of PPE Products imposed by FEMA were published on April 10, 2020. The Extension Rule became effective August 10, 2020, and will be in place until December 31, 2020 unless terminated or suspended earlier by the FEMA Administrator. Background on the original rule implementing restrictions on exports of PPE as well as certain exemptions can be found in our prior blog posts here, here, and here.

Under the Extension Rule, FEMA has modified the list of covered PPE Products by adding to, removing from, and modifying the prior list. The current list of products is as follows:

- N95 Filtering Facepiece Respirators: N95 filtering facepiece respirators continue
 to be restricted for export, but FEMA has clarified in the Extension Rule that the
 PPE Products covered items list only covers "surgical" N95 filtering facepiece
 respirators, including devices that are disposable half-face-piece non-powered
 air-purifying particulate respirators intended for use to cover the nose and mouth
 of the wearer to help reduce wearer exposure to pathogenic biological airborne
 particulates.
- PPE Exam Gloves and Surgical Gloves: FEMA is narrowing the scope of PPE gloves to PPE nitrile gloves specifically defined at 21 CFR 880.6250 (exam gloves) and 878.4460 (surgical gloves) and other such nitrile gloves intended for the same purposes.
- Surgical Gowns and Surgical Isolation Gowns: FEMA is adding Level 3 and 4
 Surgical Gowns and Surgical Isolation Gowns that meet all of the requirements in
 ANSI/AAMI PB70 and ASTM F2407-06 and are classified by Surgical Gown Bar rier Performance based on AAMI PB70 to the covered materials list.

 Surgical Masks: The list of covered materials will continue to include surgical masks.

FEMA is eliminating from the list of covered PPE Products other filtering facepiece respirators and elastomeric, air-purifying respirators and appropriate particulate filters/cartridges.

Exporters of PPE Products will likely continue to encounter delays at ports across the country, pending determinations by FEMA. Baker McKenzie continues to assist its client in preparing letters of attestation and related transactional documents to facilitate the export process and approval by FEMA of covered PPE Products that meet an exemption such as those outlined in our previous blog posts.

US Government suspends private charter flights between the United States and Cuba

On August 13, 2020, US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo issued a <u>statement</u> requesting that the US Department of Transportation (DOT) suspend private charter flights to all Cuban airports. This action will suspend all charter flights between the United States and Cuba over which the DOT exercises jurisdiction, except for authorized public charter flights to and from Havana and other private charter flights authorized for limited purposes. Secretary Pompeo's statement cites the Administration's intent to deny economic resources to the regime in order to inhibit its capacity to carry out alleged abuses and interference in Venezuela.

Background

On October 25, 2019, at Secretary Pompeo's request, the DOT issued a notice that suspended scheduled air service between the United States and Cuban international airports other than Havana's Jose Marti International Airport. On January 10, 2020, at Secretary Pompeo's request, the DOT issued a second notice that suspended all public charter flights between the United States and all Cuban destinations other than Havana. On May 28, 2020, again in response to a request from the State Department, the DOT issued an order imposing a cap on public charter flights to Havana at 3,600 per year. Please see here and here for our blog posts on the DOT's previous orders. According to Secretary Pompeo, the current suspension would prevent charter operators from filling the gap in air service left by the suspensions of non-Havana scheduled air service and public charter service that took effect on December 10, 2019, and March 10, 2020, respectively.

DOT Order

On the same day as Secretary Pompeo's statement, the DOT issued an <u>order</u> suspending all charter flights between the United States and all airports in Cuba, except for authorized public charter flights to and from Havana and other authorized charter flights for emergency and medical purposes, search and rescue, and other travel deemed to be in the interest of the United States. The suspension will take effect on October 13, 2020.

The DOT's suspension applies to charter flights operated by US and foreign air carriers pursuant to exemptions granted by the DOT, including US air taxi and

commuter operations, Canadian charter air taxi operations, and all other charter or on-demand air transportation. The suspension covers nonstop charter flights from the United States to Cuba as well as charter flights stopping at a third country (whether as an intermediate stop or as a behind or beyond point).

In addition, the DOT also tentatively decided to amend, subject to show-cause procedures, all US charter air carrier certificates and all foreign air carrier permits to preclude the operation of charter flights between the United States and Cuba, subject to the exceptions noted above. Interested parties have until September 3, 2020 to file objections to the DOT's tentative decision.

OFAC adjusts 'schedule amounts'

On August 11, 2020, the Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) published in the Federal Register a <u>final rule</u> to make technical amendments to the definition of "applicable schedule amount" in its regulations. In recent years, OFAC has adjusted its civil monetary penalties (CMPs) as required by the *Federal Civil Penalties Inflation Adjustment Act*, as amended by the *Federal Civil Penalties Inflation Adjustment Act Improvements Act of 2015.* While OFAC's "applicable schedule amount" values are not civil monetary penalties that are required to be adjusted pursuant to such statute, OFAC is making technical changes to this definition to ensure the applicable schedule amount values continue to correspond appropriately to OFAC's CMPs.

OFAC's Enforcement Guidelines provide a general framework for the enforcement of all economic sanctions programs administered by OFAC. Section V.B.2.a.ii. of the Enforcement Guidelines states that the base' amount of a proposed civil penalty in a Pre-Penalty Notice shall be the "applicable schedule amount," subject to certain caps noted in that section, where the case is deemed non-egregious and the apparent violation has come to OFAC's attention by means other than a voluntary self-disclosure. Section I.B. of the Enforcement Guidelines provides a definition of "applicable schedule amount."

BIS adds 24 Chinese Companies to the Entity List for their activities in the South China Sea

On August 27, 2020, the US Commerce Department's Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS) issued a final rule ("Final Rule") adding 24 Chinese state-owned entities to the Entity List (the "SCS Designees"), including several subsidiaries of China Communications Construction Company (CCCC), due to their ties to land reclamation efforts involving artificial islands in the South China Sea. In a press statement released with the designations, the Commerce Department cited the role played by the SCS Designees in building and militarizing artificial islands in parts of the South China Sea that are subject to conflicting maritime claims. The Final Rule also included 36 additional Entity List designations for reasons unrelated to the South China Sea. In conjunction with this action, the US State Department announced that it is imposing visa restrictions on individuals "responsible for, or complicit in, either the large-scale reclamation, construction, or militarization of disputed outposts in the South China Sea, or the PRC's use of coercion against Southeast Asian claimants to inhibit their access to offshore resources," as well as their immediate family members.

Final Rule Restrictions

As a result of the Entity List designations, no supplier – US or non-US, wherever located – may export, reexport, or transfer (in country) any commodity, software, or technology ("items") subject to the Export Administration Regulations (EAR) to the SCS Designees or where an SCS Designee is a purchaser, intermediate consignee, ultimate consignee or end-user, unless authorized by a BIS license. BIS will review license applications related to the SCS Designees with a presumption of denial. In addition, no EAR license exceptions may be used for exports/reexports/transfers of items subject to the EAR to the SCS Designees or where an SCS Designee is a purchaser, intermediate consignee, ultimate consignee or end-user.

Basis for the South China Sea Designations

The addition of the SCS Designees to the Entity List marks the first time that the Entity List has been used to target Chinese companies involved in land reclamation and construction activities in disputed territory in the South China Sea. In a briefing with State and Commerce Department officials on the designations, a senior State Department official highlighted the recently updated US policy regarding China's maritime claims in the South China Sea (the "July 2020 Policy"). The July 2020 Policy aligned US policy with a 2016 arbitral award by the Permanent Court of Arbitration in the Hague that found certain of China's land reclamation activities to be in areas that are part of the Philippines' exclusive economic zone and continental shelf.

Potential Connections to the "One Belt One Road" Initiative

The addition of the SCS Designees to the Entity List appears to be partially motivated by concerns about the role played by Chinese state-owned enterprises engaging in projects as part of China's "One Belt One Road" initiative. In the State Department briefing, the senior official acknowledged the prominent role of many of the SCS Designees in this initiative and emphasized that the "use of state-owned enterprises for the bullying and coercion of others" is associated with "One Belt One Road" projects outside the context of the South China Sea. As such, the senior official's comments suggest that the Trump Administration may continue to scrutinize Chinese state-owned entities' involvement in "One Belt One Road" projects and that such entities may be targeted by future Entity List designations.

Commerce Department expands Huawei- and Entity List-related rules, further restricting Huawei's access to semiconductors produced from US technology and software

On August 17, 2020, the US Commerce Department's Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS) issued a final rule (published in the Federal Register on August 20, 2020) (i) expanding the *Export Administration Regulations* (EAR) General Prohibition Three (the foreign-produced direct product rule, or the "FPDP Rule") to further restrict Huawei Technologies Co. Ltd. and its affiliates designated on the BIS Entity List (collectively, "Huawei") from acquiring foreign-produced semiconductors that are the direct product of certain US software and technology, (ii) removing the Temporary General License (TGL) previously authorizing certain transactions with Huawei, and (iii) adding thirty-eight additional affiliates of Huawei to the Entity List. These changes became effective August 17, 2020. Concurrently with

the Final Rule, BIS issued another <u>rule</u> clarifying that the Entity List's licensing requirements apply when any party on the Entity List (not just Huawei entities) acts as a purchaser, intermediate consignee, ultimate consignee, or end user in a transaction involving items subject to the EAR.

Below we highlight some of the key elements of these rules. For further details, including the parameters of the applicable savings clauses, a comprehensive review of the rules is recommended.

The Further Expanded FPDP Rule

In May 2020, BIS expanded the FPDP Rule to restrict Huawei from acquiring foreign-made semiconductors produced or developed from certain US technology or software. Please see our prior blog post <u>here</u> regarding the May 2020 expansion of the FPDP Rule. The Final Rule introduces a number of changes to the FPDP Rule that build upon the May 2020 expansion of the FPDP Rule.

Under the Final Rule, the expanded FPDP Rule prohibits the reexport, export from abroad, or transfer (in-country) of (i) certain "foreign-produced items" controlled under the amended footnote 1 to the Entity List ("New Footnote 1") when there is (ii) "knowledge" of certain circumstances, the scope of which were also expanded.

Broader Universe of "Foreign-Produced Items"

The universe of "foreign-produced items" subject to New Footnote 1 captures any item that is:

- A direct product of technology or software subject to the EAR and specified in certain Export Control Classification Numbers (ECCNs) in Categories 3, 4, and 5 of the Commerce Control List (the "Covered ECCNs." listed below); or
- A direct product of a plant or major component of a plant located outside the United States, when the plant or major component of a plant (whether made in the United States or a foreign country) itself is a direct product of US-origin technology or software subject to the EAR and specified in the Covered ECCNs.

Paragraph (a) previously included language also requiring that items be "produced or developed by an entity with a footnote 1 designation on the Entity list" to fall within the scope of the expanded FPDP Rule. Similarly, Paragraph (b) previously included language also requiring that items be "a direct product of 'technology' or 'software' produced or developed by an entity with a footnote 1 designation on the Entity list" to fall within the scope of the expanded FPDP Rule. Broadly speaking, the previous footnote 1 captured foreign-produced items, such as chips, that were the product of Huawei-produced or -developed software or technology (e.g., design specifications). The New Footnote 1 is more expansive, and can capture foreign-produced items produced or developed by any party – with no input from Huawei – if there is "knowledge" of Huawei's involvement in a transaction, as discussed further below.

The list of Covered ECCNs remains unchanged from the May 2020 FPDP Rule, and continues to include the following ECCNs: 3D001, 3D991, 3E001, 3E002, 3E003, 3E991, 4D001, 4D993, 4D994, 4E001, 4E992, 4E993, 5D001, 5D991, 5E001, and 5E991.

Broader Scope of Circumstances Subject to the "Knowledge" Standard

Under the Final Rule, "knowledge" (defined under the EAR to include actual knowledge and reason to know) of a broader range of circumstances triggers the licensing requirements with respect to the "foreign-produced items" controlled under the New Footnote 1. This expansion captures a wider range of transactions involving Huawei. Specifically, the expanded FPDP Rule applies to the "foreign-produced items" controlled under New Footnote 1 when there is "knowledge" that:

- The foreign-produced item will be incorporated into, or will be used in the production or development of any part, component, or equipment produced, purchased, or ordered by any entity with a footnote 1 designation; or
- Any entity with a footnote 1 designation is a party to any transaction involving the foreign-produced item, e.g., as a purchaser, intermediate consignee, ultimate consignee, or end-user.

The previous May 2020 FPDP Rule only required "knowledge" that the foreign-produced item is destined for Huawei entities.

Additional License Review Policy

The Final Rule also establishes an additional license review policy (in Note to introductory paragraph to New Footnote 1) for foreign-produced items that are "capable of supporting the 'development' or 'production' of telecom systems, equipment and devices at only below the 5G level (e.g., 4G, 3G, etc.)," which BIS would review on a case-by-case basis for licensing decisions, rather than under a presumption of denial. This new note further states that "[s]ophistication and capabilities of technology in items" is a factor in BIS's license application review.

Removal of the Huawei TGL

The Final Rule removes the Huawei TGL, which authorized certain transactions involving the export, reexport, and transfer (in-country) of items subject to the EAR to Huawei. In doing so, BIS decided to preserve the TGL's cybersecurity research and vulnerability disclosure authorization, and implemented that decision by adding a new footnote 2 to the Entity List, and revising the Huawei-related Entity List entries to refer to that new footnote.

Addition of Additional Non-US Affiliates of Huawei to the Entity List

The Final Rule also adds thirty-eight additional non-US affiliates of Huawei to the Entity List and revises four existing Huawei entries, which impact Huawei affiliates in twenty-one different jurisdictions. The Final Rule lists Huawei entities located in Hong Kong under the Entity List heading for Hong Kong, which BIS describes as consistent with the Executive Order 13936 of July 14, 2020 revoking preferential trade treatment for Hong Kong. Please see our prior blog post on that development here.

9, 2019 <u>here</u>; on BIS's authorization of the release of certain technologies to Huawei entities on the Entity List in connection with standards-development activities on June 15, 2020 <u>here</u>.

Clarification of Entity List-related Restrictions

Concurrently with the Final Rule, BIS issued another <u>rule</u> clarifying that the Entity List's licensing requirements apply when any party on the Entity List acts as a "purchaser," "intermediate consignee," "ultimate consignee," or "end user" (as defined under the EAR) in a transaction involving items subject to the EAR. This applies to all circumstances where the Entity List's licensing requirements are triggered, not just when Huawei entities are involved or the expanded FPDP Rule is applicable. Prior to this rule, Section 744.11 of the EAR, pursuant to which BIS adds parties to the Entity List, stated that a license is required (as specified on the Entity List) to export/reexport or transfer (in-country) any item subject to the EAR to an entity designated on the Entity List.

Trump Administration approves updated unmanned aerial system export policy

On July 24, 2020, the Trump Administration announced a new policy (the "Updated UAS Policy") on exports of US-origin unmanned aerial systems (UAS), also known as "drones." The Updated UAS Policy follows the Trump Administration's UAS policy reforms announced in April 2018 ("April 2018 UAS Export Policy"), which allowed exports of certain US-origin armed and unarmed UAS to occur via direct sales between US companies and foreign end users. Our previous blog post on the April 2018 UAS Export Policy is available here. The Updated UAS Policy does not change UAS export licensing requirements under the International Traffic in Arms Regulations or the Export Administration Regulations, but does remove a major restriction on exports of US-origin UAS.

The Trump Administration's new policy comes at a time when the UAS regulatory climate is undergoing rapid transformation. As previously discussed on Baker McKenzie's <u>UAS Insights blog</u>, the Federal Aviation Administration is in the process of promulgating regulations that would require UAS to have <u>remote identification</u> and would authorize <u>UAS operations at night and over people</u>, and is overseeing a <u>pilot program</u> to promote innovative UAS uses such as supply deliveries.

US Reinterpretation of the MTCR Guidelines

The Missile Technology Control Regime (MTCR) is an informal, voluntary arrangement among partner countries to limit the proliferation of nuclear, biological, and chemical weapon delivery systems and related technology through common export policy guidelines. Historically, military UAS and related sub-systems, software, and technology were listed in MTCR Category I. Export license applications for MTCR Category I items are subject to an unconditional strong presumption of denial. As part of the Updated UAS Policy, the Trump Administration will reinterpret the MTCR Guidelines so that a subset of MTCR Category I UAS with a maximum airspeed of less than 800 kilometers per hour will be listed under MTCR Category II. MTCR Category II items are generally considered less-sensitive and are subject to case-by-case review in terms of export licensing. The White House noted in a press statement released with the Updated UAS Policy

that efforts begun in April 2018 to modify the MTCR's guidelines had failed and thus the Trump Administration is now implementing this policy unilaterally.

Focus on Increasing UAS Exports

The Updated UAS Policy appears to be partially motivated by an effort to increase US manufacturers' share of the UAS export market. In the White House statement, the Trump Administration asserted that the policy change "will increase our national security by improving the capabilities of our partners and increase our economic security by opening the UAS market to United States industry." As such, the Updated UAS Policy reflects the broader effort to increase consideration of economic interests in arms transfer decisions under the Trump Administration and promote exports of UAS to US allies and partners.

Commerce suspends license exceptions for Hong Kong that provide differential treatment relative to China

On July 31, 2020, the Department of Commerce Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS) amended the *Export Administration Regulations* (EAR) to suspend the availability of all License Exceptions for Hong Kong that provide differential treatment relative to mainland China. Our blog post on prior steps taken to revoke preferential treatment for Hong Kong, including the initial announcement of these suspensions, is available here.

The following partial or full License Exceptions are no longer available for exports and reexports to Hong Kong, and transfers within Hong Kong, of all items subject to the EAR:

- 1. Shipments of Limited Value (LVS) (§ 740.3);
- 2. Shipments to Group B Countries (GBS) (§ 740.4);
- 3. Technology and Software under Restriction (TSR) (§ 740.6):
- 4. Computers, Tier 1 only (APP) (§ 740.7(c));
- Temporary Imports, Exports, Reexports, and Transfers (in-country) (TMP) (§ 740.9(a)(11), (b)(2)(ii)(C, and (b)(5));
- Servicing and Replacement Parts and Equipment (RPL) (§ 740.10(a)(3)(viii), (a)(4), (b)(1) except as permitted to Country Group D:5, and (b)(3)(i)(F) and (ii)(C));
- 7. Governments (GOV) (§ 740.11(c)(1)—Cooperating Governments only));
- 8. Gift Parcels and Humanitarian Donations (GFT) (§ 740.12);
- 9. Technology and Software Unrestricted (TSU) (§ 740.13);
- 10. Baggage (BAG) (§ 740.14) (except as permitted by § 740.14(d));

FDA to revise regulations to collect certain ACE data

On August 3, 2020, the US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) published in the Federal Register a <u>notice of proposed rulemaking</u> [Docket No. FDA–2018–N–4268] to amend its regulations, with Treasury's concurrence, to require that certain data elements be submitted for veterinary devices that are being imported or offered for import in the Automated Commercial Environment (ACE) or any other electronic data interchange (EDI) system authorized by US Customs and Border

Protection (CBP), in order for CBP to process the filing and to help FDA in determining the admissibility of that veterinary device. The proposed rule would make the submission of the general data elements currently required to be submitted in ACE for other FDA-regulated products at the time of entry also required in ACE for veterinary devices being imported or offered for import into the United States. This proposed rule would increase effective and efficient admissibility review by FDA of those entry lines containing a veterinary device, which will protect public health by allowing the Agency to focus its limited resources on FDA-regulated products that may be associated with a greater public health risk. Comments on the proposed rule must be submitted by October 19, 2020. Comments on information collection issues under the Paperwork Reduction Act of 1995 (PRA) must be submitted by September 2, 2020.

ANTIDUMPING AND SUBSIDIES

Commerce proposes regulations to improve AD/CVD administration and enforcement

On August 13, 2020, Enforcement and Compliance, International Trade Administration, Department of Commerce, published in the Federal Register a proposed rule [Docket No. 200626-0170] to modify its regulations under Part 351 of Title 19 to improve administration and enforcement of the antidumping duty (AD) and countervailing duty (CVD) laws. Specifically, Commerce proposes to modify its regulation concerning the time for submission of comments pertaining to industry support in AD and CVD proceedings; to modify its regulation regarding new shipper reviews; to modify its regulation concerning scope matters in AD and CVD proceedings; to promulgate a new regulation concerning circumvention of AD and CVD orders; to promulgate a new regulation concerning covered merchandise referrals received from US Customs and Border Protection (CBP); to promulgate a new regulation pertaining to Commerce requests for certifications from interested parties to establish whether merchandise is subject to an AD or CVD order; and to modify its regulation regarding importer reimbursement certifications filed with CBP. Finally, Commerce proposes to modify its regulations regarding letters of appearance in AD and CVD proceedings and importer filing requirements for access to business proprietary information. Commerce is seeking public comments on this proposed rule. To be assured of consideration, written comments must be received no later than September 14, 2020.

FAS issues updated guidance on China's retaliatory tariffs and exclusion process for US products

On August 5, 2020, the US Foreign Agricultural Service (FAS) issued a report entitled Updated Guidance on China's Retaliatory Tariffs and Tariff Exclusions Process for US Products [Report CH2020-0106]. The report consolidates China's previous announcements of additional tariffs on US agriculture, fish, and wood products and information concerning the Chinese government exclusion process for imports of US products. It is meant to provide US exporters a clear picture of the current status of China's retaliatory tariffs and exclusion process. The report is not the result of new actions by China but organizes previously reported information in a single resource.

The tariff tables include the latest applied import tariffs on US agriculture, fish, and wood products and have notations for products that received a product-specific tariff exclusion or are included China's more recent tariff exclusion process. Also included are links to all tariff and exclusion related reports published by the Foreign Agricultural Service's Office of Agricultural Affairs in Beijing to date.

Appendix tables at the end of the report show the current MFN rate, the 232 and 301 retaliatory tariffs and the total duty for 8 digit codes 01012900 to 53029000 (with certain exceptions) and includes applicable exclusions.

SINGAPORE

Singapore tightens strategic goods controls

In brief

Singapore updated its strategic goods control regime on 3 August 2020 to ensure robust administration of controls and effective risk assessments, while ensuring the facilitation of legitimate trade. Key amendments include ensuring individual and bulk permit holders have access to English translations for strategic trade records kept in other languages. For bulk permit holders, expanded document categories under recordkeeping requirements and monthly reporting will apply. A new offence has also been created for failing to amend permits in the event that information submitted under initial permit application processes subsequently change.

Recommended Actions

- Review current processes to understand which expanded documentation and operational requirements have already been captured.
- Identify gaps between current recordkeeping measures and new requirements.

In more detail

As part of its efforts to prevent the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction, Singapore regulates (amongst other activities) the transhipment, transit, transmission and export of military and dual-use goods and technology.

The key legislation governing this is *Singapore's Strategic Goods (Control) Act* (Chapter 300) (SGCA). Recent amendments to the SGCA's implementing regulations, the *Strategic Goods (Control) Regulations* (SGCR) took effect on 3 August. Pursuant to these amendments, Singapore Customs also published <u>Circular No:</u> 05/2020. We provide an overview of key updates below:

- English Translations Required. If documents maintained under recordkeeping requirements are not in English, English translations have to be provided within 14 days upon request by Singapore Customs.
- Amendments to Permits. Should information supplied or any supporting documentation under a permit change after permit grant, permit holders must apply to amend permit within 14 days. The recent SGCR amendment creates a new offence for failing to amend permits.
- 3. Monthly Reports. Bulk permit holders must submit monthly reports to Singapore Customs "on the 14th of every month, or at such other time or interval as required". These reports have to contain information relating to the goods, documents or technologies that are transferred under the bulk permit including the transferred items' descriptions, values, quantities, dates of transfer, supplier information; end-user information; and any other relevant information Singapore Customs may require. Circular No: 05/2020 provides guidance for monthly reports concerning intangible transmissions of technology (ITT). ITT reports should be sent to Customs_schemes@customs.gov.sg on the 14th of every month or upon request.
- 4. Expanded Recordkeeping Requirements for Bulk Permit Holders. The scope of documents required to be maintained by bulk permit holders have also been significantly expanded. Apart from the information requirements under paragraph 3 above, bulk permit holders will now also be required to maintain screening documents, business transactional documents, internal audit reports, internal training records, instructions to business affiliates, and reports of any non-compliance, where applicable.
- Registered Persons (Brokering). Registered persons for brokering must also submit a report (including a report stating a nil return) to Singapore Customs on the 30th day of June and December in each calendar year, or at such other time or interval as required by Singapore Customs.

EU announces sanctions on Belarus

On 19 August 2020, members of the European Council held a video conference to discuss the situation in Belarus following the presidential election on 9 August 2020. The President of the European Council stated that the elections in Belarus were "neither free nor fair", did not meet international standards and that the EU did not recognize the results. It was announced that the EU would shortly impose

sanctions on a substantial number of individuals responsible for violence, repression, and election fraud in Belarus. The identity of these individuals has not yet been revealed.

Commission issues tariff classification regulations

No tariff classification regulations were issued by the European Commission during the period covered by this Update.

Amendments to the CN Explanatory Notes

No amendments to the *Explanatory Notes to the Combined Nomenclature of the European Union* were published in the *Official Journal* during the period covered by this Update.

Binding Tariff Information

The European Community has created the Binding Tariff Information (BTI) system as a tool to assist economic operators to obtain the correct tariff classification for goods they intend to import or export.

Since 1 October 2019 all BTI correspondence between the economic operator and the customs authority is happening through the <u>Trader Portal</u>. This includes among others applications by economic operators for BTI decisions, requests by the customs authority for further information on the product being classified and the economic operators' replies to those questions. A list of customs authorities designated by Member States for the purposes of receiving applications, or taking decisions relating to binding tariff information may be found <u>here</u>.

Depending on the Member State an economic operator has to access either the <u>EU Customs trader portal</u> or the <u>national trader portal</u>. You can search and consult existing BTIs on the <u>EBTI-database</u>.

The Netherlands Customs Declarations Management System to replace the old declaration system

On 20 August 2020, the Belastingdienst (Tax and Customs Administration) announced that with effect from July 2022, the Customs Declarations Management System (DMS) will replace the old declaration system (AGS). This will mark the end of the Automated Periodic Declaration (GPA) and the Written Periodic Declaration (SPA).

In DMS, instead of using the GPA or the SPA, you can make customs declarations as follows:

- normal declaration procedure, with a simplified (incomplete) variant and prior declaration
- entry in the declarant's records, with presentation and periodical supplementary declaration
- entry in the declarant's records, with exemption from presentation and periodical supplementary declaration

The first option, the normal declaration procedure, is the same as the AGS.

For the second and third options, your company needs an 'Authorisation for Entry in the Declarant's Records' (IIAA).

The "presentation" requires you to send Customs a message that meets pre-defined specifications.

The supplementary declaration must be filed within 10 days of the end of the period in which the goods were entered in the records. This period is set at 1 (calendar) day. That means you can no longer make a monthly declaration.

Companies with several IIAA authorisations for successive (special) customs procedures can be granted an exemption from presentation of the goods on subsequent release for free circulation or placement under a subsequent special customs procedure. This is however subject to the condition that the goods continue to be entered under successive authorisations in the same company records.
